Course Description SOC 1306 – GLB/US Social Problems

Credit Hours: 3

The world as we know it, is made up of many layers. Oftentimes connecting us to each other through experiences that range from the most positive to the most challenging. Our social problems are diverse in their nature, reflective of the ways in which our world is diverse in its existence. Globally, people are faced with the challenge of injustice and inequality at many intersections of identity. We are forced to reckon with the ways that our actions or lack thereof, impact that of our neighbors. We are forced to bear witness to the atrocities that many face under the oppressive weight of different systems. And then, we are left with the task of choosing how we want to respond to these.

This course is an invitation to think critically about the ways we exist within a

world filled with social problems. It is meant to make you question, answer, doubt, and affirm your stance on issues regarding race, ethnicity, gender, wealth, crime, education, housing, health, war, etc. There is no one answer, but you will find that as you progress in this class, your perspectives will broaden. For it is true, that what some consider the problem, is the solution to others. And through this merge of ideas and perspectives, we can cultivate social change.

By making use of the sociological perspectives available to you through the course materials, you will analyze the concerns of our society on a micro and macro level.

The main goals of the course (SLOs) are:

- Be able to view how social problems affect people at the individual, group, and societal levels;
- Be able to understand the significance of social inequality and race, class, and gender as key factors in our understanding of problems in the United States and worldwide;
- Be able to place specific social problems within a larger social inequality framework:
- Be able to create a comprehensive view of contemporary perspectives on a vast array of social problems impacted by new technologies on social life and how the media depict social issues;
- Be able to apply the sociological imagination and relevant sociological perspectives to all the topics in a systematic manner

- At a minimum, you must have Microsoft Office 2013, 2010, 2007 or Open Office.
 Microsoft Office is the standard office productivity software utilized by faculty,

students, and staff. Microsoft Word is the standard word processing software, Microsoft Excel is the standard spreadsheet software, and Microsoft PowerPoint is the standard presentation software. Copying and pasting, along with attaching/uploading documents for assignment submission, will also be required. If you do not have Microsoft Office, you can check with the bookstore to see if they have any student copies.

Tests: You will have 2 tests that will serve to assess your knowledge at different points of the semester. One will be during the midterm timeframe and one during the finals timeframe. These test weigh the same as your response papers and will allow you to complete more than one attempt so you can keep the highest score as your final.

Readings/Audiovisual Materials: You will have assigned materials to aid you in the completion of the course. You are required to engage with these and reflect said engagement in the work (discussions, response papers, etc.) that you submit.

Points are accumulated in this course instead of averaged. You will have a grade report on D2L keeping track of your points as this semester progresses. Your grade is <u>not</u> negotiable. It is your responsibility to keep up with your grades and your progress in the class. I will not change grades at the end of the semester, so please do not email me asking if you can do anything for a better grade. Keep up with your work during the semester.
