Course Description

The course examines ways sociology majors can synthesize sociology curriculum and apply the sociological perspective to the real world, along with their knowledge and skills outside the academic world in real work settings. In addition, this course will guide students in the process of resume preparation, interviewing skills, graduate program, and career opportunities available

with a sociology major. Special attention will be given to leadership skills needed in the world of work. Prerequisite SOC 111, 331, 332, 436, and a senior status.

Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

- Students will be accountable for developing an intermediate (average) amount of sociological knowledge. Thus the student should be familiar with the majority of the sociological concepts that exist in most introductory textbooks. To measure this objective students will be expected to use the sociological concepts during class activities b. To measure this objective students will be expected to perform at least in an average manner (70 points or better) on a multiple choice and an essay exam to be administered during this course
- 2. Students will become familiar and investigate what professional employment exists for sociology majors. This SLO will be assessed in weekly in class assignments and projects.
- 3. Students will produce materials for their post graduation job search, such as a resume and cover letter. SLO will be measured by an assessment of these materials.

Classroom Expectations:

- 1. Students must be prepared to participate in group work and be prepared to take notes and complete work with their peers.
- 2. Students must come prepared to learn. That's why it is essential to participate in class discussions online and by reading the chapter ahead of time.
- 3. Please treat everyone with respect. Disrespectful behavior towards anyone in the classroom will not be tolerated. You will be asked to leave the course if disrespectful behavior persists.

Assessments:

Weekly Online Assignments (15X20=300)

This class is a blended course, which means that a large component of this course will be online. Every week Friday you will have an online assignment related to reviewing sociological materials from the various theoretical and methodological things you have covered in previous Sociology courses and assignments directed towards preparing for the job market.

Research Paper: (200)

This assignment will allow students to continue demonstrating their ability to construct a senior quality research paper. Students will demonstrate their skills in conceiving a thought and following it through to completion. Students may use the ASA or APA style of writing and citation (students ought to know the difference between these two styles of citation). Pick a topic and share it with me if you want to ensure that it is sociological.

- •The research paper assignment will be worth 200 points.
- The paper must have at least 3 scholarly references.
- The paper must be at least 5 pages double spaced (not including the cover or the reference pages).

As a rule of thumb, one cites whenever they are paraphrasing other people's words or when they quote other's words directly. You may learn to cite from a variety of different sources including the APA Tutorial and PURDUE OWL. It is the student's responsibility to understand how to cite properly. If you have questions, feel free to ask.

Midterm Exam: (200)

The midterm exam will review basic sociological concepts to ensure that students have developed a relative knowledge of the major theories and methods within the discipline of Sociology. The midterm exam will be multiple choice, 50 questions and focus on the sociological themes we discuss in the beginning of the course

Job Preparation Packets (3X100)=300

Resume (100 points): You will craft a professional resume that you can utilize when you graduate to apply to professional jobs after your college.

Cover Letter (100 points): You will craft a professional cover letter directed for two jobs that you want to apply to.

Mock Interview (100 points): I will partner you with each other to conduct mock interviews with each other. You will have to dress to impress as if you were truly interviewing for a position. You will work on potential interview questions in one of your weekly assignments.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

To be successful in the course you must be able to use D2L, and using Microsoft Word and PowerPoint. Attendance will also be crucial in order to complete in-class assignments.

Instructional Methods

This course will be delivered partially online. You must have access to D2L in order to complete the requirements for this course.
