### **COURSE INFORMATION**

#### **Course Description**

Explores rural community health nursing, focusing on historical development, philosophy, health care systems, epidemiology, individuals, families, and specific aggregate groups. Applies theoretical and empirical knowledge in using the nursing process in rural community settings to promote, maintain and restore health. Focuses on trans-cultural nursing concepts, rural, and home health care delivery. Diverse roles of the community and public health nurse are examined, and a rural community assessment is completed using research and data processing skills.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Examine the development and role of public health, rural health, community health, community-based nursing, social determinants of health, and the transformation of the health care system domestically and globally. (PLO 2, 6; AACN Essentials 1, 2, 3.1 (a, c, d, e); 3.3 (b); 3.4 (e); 3.5 (c), 4, 5, 7; BON DECS: IV. A).

2. Apply ethical theories, principles, laws, and government regulations inherent in the core functions of population and community health nursing practice (PLO 1, 2, 6; AACN Essentials: 3.1 (c, h, i); 3.5 (c), 4, 9; BON DECS: III. A).
3. Analyze relationships between epidemiological principles and levels of prevention in the practice of population and community health nursing. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 6; AACN Essentials Domains 3.1(b, c, e,); 3.3 (b), 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10; BON DEC: IV A, B, G. ).
4. Evaluate the impact of primary health care, health promotion and disease prevention, social determinants of health, and community resources on the health needs of individuals, families, aggregates, communities and cities (PLO 1, 2, 3, AACN Essentials Domains 2, 3.1(a, b, c, e); 3.2(a, d, e), ; BON DECS: IV B, C, G).
5. Collaborate with community organizations to identify the role of the community health nurse in addressing basic needs, preparing for, and responding to simulated disasters and threats to the health and welfare of the community members.(PLO 1, 2, 4, 6; AACN Essentials Domains 3.2 (a, h); 3.6 (a, b, c, d, e), 6 ; BON DECS: IV G)

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

### **Minimal Technical Skills Needed**

Students must have an adequate working knowledge of the learning management system, Leomail, Microsoft Office Suite, Exemplify, ProjectConcert, and ATI online products.

### **Instructional Methods**

Teaching methods include lecture, seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, student presentations, and assignments. While the faculty will provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation, and demonstration of course objectives.

### **Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course**

- Logging into the course website and email regularly for faculty communication (especially the night before class/clinical)

- Updating semester calendar with communicated changes
- Regular study (recommend a minimum 2-3 hours study/course credit hour per week). For example: 3-credit course = 6 to 9 hours study time/week.
- Attendance at all class meetings, clinical, seminars and simulations
- Review and remediation of examinations.

### Grading

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:

A = 90%-100%    B = 80%-89%    C = 75%-79%    D = 60%-74%    F = Below 60%

**A minimum grade of 75% is required to pass the course.** The average of the 3 course exam grades (Exam 1, Exam 2, Exam 3) **MUST** be 75% or greater before ANY other course assignment grades are averaged to compose the final grade. If the exam average is below 75%, the student will receive the grade of “D or F” for the course regardless of any other grade(s).

The clinical component is PASS/FAIL and must be passed in order to pass the course. To receive a passing grade in clinical you must achieve 75% or better on each of the clinical assignments and receive a satisfactory clinical evaluation. You may redo any assignments that are less than 75% one time but 75% is the maximum grade you will receive for the redone assignment.

**Clinical is graded Pass/Fail. If the student fails the clinical component, the entire course must be repeated.**

Students must also adhere to the expected clinical behaviors. Any instance of violation of any of the objectives listed in the Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form may result in clinical suspension, receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation form, failure of clinical, failure of the course, and/or removal from the nursing program. (See **BSN Student Guidebook** for more information.)

**Late Submissions:**

It is expected that students will submit all class and clinical assignments on time. If an extension is needed, it should be requested **before** the due date/time and may or may not be approved at the discretion of the course coordinator. Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue; on the 3rd day, the grade will be assigned as 0%. Communication on these matters is the student's responsibility. Multiple instances of late clinical assignments may result in receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and, possibly, failure of clinical/course.

**Paper Submissions:**

All documents submitted online are to be in .docx (Word) or .rtf (Rich Text File) format. **No other formats will be accepted (JPEG, GIF, PDF, etc.).** Assignments need to be submitted in a maximum of one document per assignment. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in a grade of "0" on the assignment.

**Group Work:**

All group members will receive the same grade on any group work. A student can be removed from an assigned group if the other students in the group come to the Course Coordinator and report that a student is not doing a fair share of the work. If this issue occurs, the Coordinator will communicate with the student reported as not contributing and may remove the student from the group. The student will then be responsible for completing the assignment solely. It is expected that the group will make the attempt to resolve the situation within the group before coming to the Course Coordinator for intervention.

**Assessments (Class)**

The due dates are noted on the Course Calendar. Assessments are to be submitted to D2L. The rubrics for assessments are located within this Course Syllabus.

**Movie Assignment:**

Students will watch a documentary (available through the library link in D2L) and review the different types of nursing in the community. Students will then answer questions and submit via the course D2L.

### **Community Assessment Paper and Presentation:**

**The purpose of this assignment is for** students to work as a group to provide a comprehensive report reflecting theoretical study and practical analysis of the health of a designated community population.

Conduct a windshield survey and observe a variety of community members in various locations. Make a video of the community windshield survey to include in the presentation. Gather data by conducting informant interviews of at least ten (10) key individuals in the community (health care providers, religious leaders, educators/teachers, and principals, elected officials such as the mayor and city council members, fire fighters, EMT/Paramedics, police, and business owners) and at least ten (10) local residents who are not considered key individuals. Identify the top three (3) health concerns using epidemiological data (TDSHS, CDC, etc.) and create a plan to address these health concerns. Create an infographic for one of the identified health topics. Students do not need to wear the uniform when completing the assessment activities, but the student ID badge should be available, in case of concerns, for these interviews.

Group and city assignments will be discussed the first day of class and posted in the course.

**Only one group member is to submit the paper and upload the presentation.** Students should use the Community Assessment Paper Grading Rubric in D2L as a guide for completion of the assignment.

One presentation will be uploaded into D2L. You will review the presentation of two peer groups and comment on these presentations.

### **Exams:**

Three (3) instructor-developed exams are scheduled. The third exam includes comprehensive questions and a group component. These exams are taken online in class and are timed. See the course schedule for the date, time, and content of each exam.

### **ATI Content Mastery Examination Total Score (Assessments, Focused Review, and Proctored Exam):**

The procedure for the ATI Assessments and Proctored Exam follows the ***BSN Standardized Assessment Examination Policy*** available in D2L.

## **Assessments (Clinical)**

### **Virtual Case Studies:**

The purpose of these assignments is for students to work individually to complete case studies related to concepts that impact the health of communities and the individuals and families who live in those communities. Completion of the case studies will deepen the students' knowledge related to the assigned topics.

**Clinical Logs:**

The purpose of this assignment is to document weekly clinical hours. The log should include hours spent at assigned facilities, and the hours spent on the group assignments such as researching, group meetings, interviews, etc. Hours reflected on the log need to be signature verified by individuals at the facilities or by those being interviewed, so a copy of the log should be available for all clinical assignments. For each entry, indicate the clinical outcomes(s) you have met with the activity by number and provide a one to two sentence key takeaway from the activity. Each week the student should be adding hours to the previous log and keeping a **cumulative** total of hours. Upload the updated document every two weeks. By the end of this course, the final clinical log will indicate all the experiences and assignments you completed during the semester and should total at least 90 hours

**Clinical Evaluation**

The purpose of this assignment is for students and instructors to assess individual clinical performance over the course of the semester. The overall evaluation of your clinical performance must be satisfactory.

**General Information for Clinical Experiences**

The clinical component is PASS/FAIL. Students are required to accumulate a **minimum** of 90 hours of clinical time throughout the semester.

Students must wear a uniform and ID badge and adhere to the dress code of East Texas A&M University Nursing for experiences at agencies/facilities unless otherwise instructed by faculty. Students should arrive on time. Faculty will visit students at clinical sites throughout the semester and consult with you and clinical staff regarding activities, appearance, and behaviors.

At all sites, students must adhere to the expected clinical behaviors. See the BSN Student Guide for more information.

Bring your individual skills checklist to every clinical experience. Nurses with whom you work will need it to document your skills in the clinical area.

If the clinical site completes work early, students must contact their clinical instructor and receive a response **before** leaving. The first time you contact any instructor, identify yourself in the text. If you do not receive a response to your text after 20 minutes, text the Course Coordinator.

Students are NOT allowed to ride in the vehicles of any facility staff member nor are they to provide a ride to any facility staff.

Students who must miss clinical for any reason should notify their clinical faculty and assigned clinical site (contact numbers are in the clinical site list) **prior** to the start time of the clinical day. Any missed clinical day/time will have to be made up.

All students are expected to manage their complex schedules and attend clinical activities as scheduled. Students are expected to plan and have the address and information regarding clinical sites ready the day prior to clinical. Students should come to clinical knowing which objectives are the focus of the activities.

#### Classroom Policies

1. Class Cancellation: If a class is canceled, the student is expected to do the readings and complete the objectives for that day. The content will still be included on examinations. The material in this syllabus and dates identified in the Course Calendar are subject to change.
2. Class attendance is expected. The students should notify course coordinator in advance of any absence.
3. Exam dates are listed in each course syllabus, and the student is expected to be present for exams. If the student will be absent, the course coordinator must be notified in advance. Failure to do so may result in the student receiving a zero for the missed exam or quiz. Review the BSN Student Guide for the exam absence process.

4. As an adult learner and responsible professional, the student is responsible for reading and completing assignments prior to class and for being prepared to participate in discussions over the assigned material. It should not be expected that all material would be covered in class. Students are expected to come to class prepared.

### **Clinical Policies**

1. Clinical attendance is mandatory. Refer to the BSN Program Student Guidebook for clinical attendance policy information. Violations of the clinical attendance policy may result in the student receiving a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and may lead to failure of the clinical portion of the course.
2. Immunizations, CPR, and TB status must be current for students to be able to attend clinical experiences at the assigned clinical location. Suspension from clinical for failure to maintain required immunizations will be considered an absence.
3. Students are expected to meet clinical expectations outlined in the clinical evaluation tool.
4. Based on student learning needs, the faculty will determine the appropriate amount of time and clinical assignments needed to assess student growth.
5. Faculty may require additional assignments and clinical work to ensure students have met clinical objectives. Students are expected to comply with any additional assignments or clinical hours assigned.
6. Students are expected to prepare for clinical practice in order to provide safe, competent care.
7. Clinical assignments must be completed on time and submitted to the clinical instructor as directed. No exceptions will be given without prior permission from the instructor.

### **Group Work:**

All members of the group will receive the same grade on any group work. However, a student can be removed from his/her team if the other students in the group come to the instructor and report that a student is not doing his/her fair share of the work. If that happens, the instructor will notify the student in writing. The student will then be responsible for doing the assignment on his/her own. It is expected that the group will make the attempt to resolve the situation within the group before instructor intervention.

### **Standardized Exams:**

ETAMU School of Nursing utilizes Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) content mastery practice assessments and content mastery proctored assessments to guide and assess mastery of nursing content necessary for entry into practice.
