## **Course Description**

**ENG 1302 – GLB/US Written Argument/Research • 3 credit hours.** This course provides students with advanced training in communication skills emphasizing the writing and reading of argumentative prose and adapting writing to alternate audiences. Students will write weekly, including such texts as journals, reading response logs, summaries of argumentative texts, argumentative papers, and longer papers integrating secondary research. Activities include close reading of sample texts, both student and professional. Some sections will emphasize special topics in both reading and writing. Prerequisites: Grade of C or better in English 1301 or advanced placement or CLEP.

## **Core Curriculum Course Objectives**

- **Critical Thinking Skills**: to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information;
- **Communication Skills**: to include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication;
- **Teamwork**: to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal;
- Personal Responsibility: to include the ability to connect choices, actions and consequences to ethical decision-making.

## **English 1302 Learning Outcomes**

- **Define** important terms/concepts including, but not limited to, literacy, community, research, ethics, knowledge, ethnography, and writing processes;
- Discuss the ways these terms expand based on cultural and communicative practices;
- Locate scholarly research related to key terms/concepts;
- **Examine** scholarly, personal, and/or multimodal texts that detail varying understandings and applications of key terms/concepts;
- **Develop** writing and research processes appropriate for ethically studying the literacy of a specific community;
- **Engage** in collaboration that supports individualized and communal understanding and writing development;
- Collect primary ethnographic data;
- Organize collected data in order to understand specific literacy community practices;
- **Consider** the various affordances and constraints of composing using different technologies (analog, digital, and/or multimodal), research methods, practices, styles, and/or languages;

- Compose texts across different genres and media of writing that further expand key terms/concepts based on primary ethnographic research and engagement with trustworthy secondary research;
- Reflect on your writing experiences and literacy practices;
- **Design** individualized learning goals appropriate for a first-year writing course; and
- **Assess** individualized learning goals based on labor and performance alongside feedback from peers and the instructor.

#### **Instructional Methods**

Spring 2025 Written Argument/Research (ENG 1302) will be taught in person on the Caddo Mills High School campus according to the academic calendar provided in D2L and at the end of this syllabus. As an instructor, I strive to provide a non-judgemental atmosphere that encourages students to flourish in the way they learn best. For this dual credit course, students will be expected to write, research, collaborate, and present ethnographic research projects. Time intensive research using online library and research resources will be required. Respectful interaction during class time predicated on a learning mindset is another requirement. Classroom discussion will be orderly with only one person speaking at a time. The expectation for any group work is that everyone will contribute to receive both an individual (from *peers* and instructor) and group grade. When students strive to improve, turn in assignments on time, and interact respectfully with each other and the instructor in this class, they will be successful.

#### COURSE REQUIREMENTS

## Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course Some pro-tips for success in this class include the following:

- Proactively keep a personal academic calendar with all assignments updated for all dual credit courses. Check this calendar daily! This can be an electronic calendar on your phone or an actual printed planner (or, like me, both); whatever best fits your learning style.
- Reach out to me for help sooner than later. I am not a "Last Minute Lucy" kind of person; however, I am aware that circumstances happen where you need special consideration for assignments. Let me know as soon as you know and we can work out the details to keep learning happening while living your lives.
- Come to class ready to participate, collaborate, make some mistakes and learn from them. Most importantly, expect to learn new things.

#### COURSE ASSESSMENT

As an instructor, my approach to classroom assessment for this course is focused on **continuous improvement**, with an emphasis on regular feedback, revision, and reflection. I believe that learning is most effective when you are encouraged to make mistakes, learn from them, and continuously refine your skills. By engaging with the course in this way, you will not only improve your writing but also gain valuable skills that will serve you beyond this course.
