COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description: This course is designed for faculty and staff. Tailored to course-taker needs, this class serves as an introductory course in conversational Spanish and Hispanic cultures. Course-takers will learn basic vocabulary and grammar skills with an emphasis on practical use of the Spanish language in an everyday setting.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete the course:

- 1. can communicate in spoken Spanish on topics of personal and general interest. Level target is Novice-low (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines.)
- 2. can understand spoken Spanish discourse related to general daily life topics. Level target is Novice-low (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines.)
- 3. can present information on topics of personal and general interest, and cultural content, using practiced phrases and simple expressions. Level target is Novice-low (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines.)
- 4. can demonstrate cultural awareness by describing and analyzing products and practices from diverse Spanish-speaking communities around the world, gaining insights on different cultural awareness.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Instructional Methods/Activities/Assessments

Participation (8 classes x 12.5%): Attendance and full participation in class is required for full credit. For each class meeting, participants will engage in a number of communication tasks related to the weekly topics. Between classes, participants are expected to complete all assigned work and prepare for class.

GRADING

Course Grades: The overall grade in the class will be assigned as either S (Satisfactory) = 60% - 100%, or U (Unsatisfactory) = 0% - 59%.
