There are no excuses in such a quick online summer course for not having daily online access for completing work in the online environment—including immediate purchase of the two ebooks required for the course.

COURSE INFORMATION

Please note that this is a reading intensive course with assignments due every weekday.

There is also a **NOAI** policy for this course and no outside materials, web searches, or information other than that assigned by the professor for this specific course will be allowed.

REQUIRED CLASS MATERIALS:

- 1. (REQUIRED)— *Give Me Liberty* 7th edition, Seagull version, volume 2 (ISBN 9781324041573)— digital edition with access to online resources.
- 2. (REQUIRED)— Voices of Freedom 7th edition, Seagull version, volume 2 (ISBN 9781324042280)— digital edition.

Double-check the textbooks you are purchasing are the correct version, edition and volume. NOTE: Both ebooks can also be purchased through the publisher directly by following the links and instructions inside D2L or with a code purchased from the campus bookstore which students will use log in and create an account through the publisher by following the links and instructions inside D2L.

- 3. Students will need access to Microsoft Word, Google Docs (saved as a .docx to upload to the class), or other word processing software that can have files saved as .docx
- 4. Access to student email.
- 5. A reliable computer/laptop/compatible tablet with reliable internet access to take the course and do the daily classwork. (Smart phones will not provide sufficient access and ability to take the course and do coursework.)

Additional Class Materials: Students will need to check their myleo email daily and for any class related news and updates check in to the D2L class and do work every weekday. Any additional reading assignments, such as brief articles, videos, or primary documents, will be supplied by the instructor in class or through D2L.

Course Description:

This course will survey the history of the United States from 1865, the events that shaped the United States following the Civil War Era. This period saw the evolution of social beliefs regarding race, gender, citizenship, the role of government, the rights of individuals, industry, economics and international affairs. As each generation of Americans shaped their era, ideals and values changed. It is the goal of this course to encourage the analysis and discussion of these changes and their driving forces. In doing so, students need to remember important events, people, places, ideas, and issues pertaining to American political, social, economic, military, cultural and intellectual history.

Prerequisite and/or Co-requisite: ENG 1301 or 1302

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Students will be able to form substantive and evidence-driven arguments to propose solutions to problems or explain phenomena.

2. Student communication will follow conventions of grammar and syntax appropriate to the audience, purpose and message.

- 3. Students will demonstrate awareness of societal and/or civic issues.
- 4. Students will be able to understand their role in their own education.

*****Responsibility Quiz: Each student will have to take the Responsibility Quiz.** These must be submitted by the Friday of the first week in class; <u>failure to submit these sheets when due will result in a failing grade for the course regardless of other work completed</u>. Questions regarding this particular course and departmental requirement should be addressed to the Department of History chairperson, Dr. Sharon Kowalsky. Students will not be dropped from the course for non-compliance.***

Required Reading: Textbook purchase of the two required ebooks is necessary starting the beginning

of the first week of class. All work requires access to the ebooks, and there is no way to pass the class without purchasing access to both ebooks. The ebooks chosen have been selected to try and provide students with the most economical textbook purchase possible while still maintaining the content needs of the course. Access to the daily readings quizzes requires access to the online materials that comes with the Give Me Liberty ebook, and all exams and weekly primary source analysis assignments require access to the primary sources in Voices of Freedom and students' contextual knowledge gained from the Give Me Liberty book and online resources to understand the primary sources.

Daily Chapter Quizzes—InQuizative Quizzes

There will be daily online multiple choice quizzes. There are links inside D2L to the book publisher's chapter InQuizitive Quizzes. Grades will also show up in D2L. There are completion questions inside the eBook for Give Me Liberty THESE ARE NOT THE WEEKLY QUIZZES. THEY WILL NOT TAKE THE PLACE OF THE InQuizitive Quizzes.

Make sure you are taking the InQuizitive Quizzes linked through the D2L class in each chapter folder in the Give Me Liberty Textbook Access Folder

Essay Exams: Two essay questions will appear on each exam, and students will choose one of these to write about. Only write one essay per exam. On the exam, these questions will be drawn randomly from a pool of questions that ask students two write a four paragraph essay using primary sources from Voices of Freedom. Students will need to follow instructions for the exams carefully to make sure they provide all the information required in the way it is asked for in the instructions. Your essay will be graded according to how well you understand, explain, and analyze both material learned in the Give Me Liberty text as well as Primary Source material provided in Voices of Freedom in order to answer the question. As part of the essays, students must refer directly to Primary Source material in Voices of Freedom and Cite page numbers and textbook names for both Voices of Freedom and Give Me Liberty according to the exam directions. Lack of citation, use of AI in any way, or the use of sources other than those specifically assigned by the professor will result in a lost points and/or a zero for the exam grade.

Students will have two hours to take the essay exams—the time starts when the student opens the exams. Each exam will be available for three days, and students can take it at any two hour time slot during those three days. Students will have two hours to take the exam in the exam window AND save a copy in a Microsoft Word document and upload to the upload link for the exam.

Primary Source Analysis Assignments: Students are required to do two primary source analysis during the semester. Students can start it any time during the weeks they are assigned and must complete them before the deadline. For the Primary Source Analysis Assignments, students must refer directly to Primary Source material in Voices of Freedom and cite page numbers and textbook names for both Voices of Freedom and Give Me Liberty according to the exam directions. Lack of citation, use of AI in any way, or the use of sources other than those specifically assigned by the professor will result in a lost points and/or a zero for the assignment grade.

Make-ups-

<u>Quizzes:</u> There are no make-up quizzes for the class. Students will have from the start of the semester to take all quizzes in the course. Each quiz will close on the deadline. They will not be reopened. There is unlimited time and unlimited takes for quizzes until the deadline. Start early and do not wait until the last minute to take the readings quizzes. It takes some students a number of hours to do well, while other can complete it quickly—all which depends on each individual student's learning style.

<u>Exams</u>: Students will have two hours to take the essay exams—the time starts when the student opens the exams. Each exam will be available for three days, and students can take it at any two hour time slot during those three days. Students will have two hours to take the exam in the exam window AND save a copy in a Microsoft Word document and upload to the upload link for the exam. Students who have accommodation needs documented and registered with the SDS Office at ETAMU will need to contact the instructor of the course via email for instructions on how to access alternative testing according to their modification requirements. No make-up exams will be allowed unless there is a dire and

documented reason for the student's request. The instructor of the course reserves the right to deny any make-up exam requests. No make-up exams requests for the Final Exam will be granted.

<u>Assignments.</u> There will be no make-ups allowed for primary source analysis assignments. Students who have accommodation needs documented and registered with the SDS Office at ETAMU will need to contact the instructor of the course via email for instructions on how to access alternative primary source analysis turn in instructions according to their modification requirements.
