Course Description

Intensive approach to acting styles to help the advanced student (1) sharpen technical skills; (2) gain experience in problem-solving situations for the actor; and (3) increase

awareness of the complexities of the actor's craft. Memorized scene work; exercises in language, movement and characterization.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Analyze Shakespearean text through the combined lenses of Strasberg's Method, Adler's script analysis techniques, and Meisner's truthful behavior approaches
- Apply specific acting techniques from each methodology to Shakespeare's verse and prose (emotional memory from Strasberg, social/historical context from Adler, repetition exercises from Meisner)
- Synthesize textual analysis with embodied performance techniques to create psychologically complex character interpretations (RSC)
- Demonstrate advanced vocal techniques specific to Shakespearean language, including iambic pentameter, rhetoric, and heightened speech patterns (RSC)
- Execute meaningful physical choices that authentically express character objectives within Shakespeare's heightened language framework
- Evaluate the unique contributions and limitations of each methodology when applied to classical verse
- Develop personalized approaches to Shakespeare performance that integrate elements from multiple acting traditions
- Create and defend original interpretations of Shakespearean characters using evidence from text analysis and psychological insight
- Demonstrate the ability to shift between internal (Strasberg), contextual (Adler), and relational (Meisner) approaches as appropriate to different Shakespearean texts
- Articulate a coherent personal philosophy regarding contemporary approaches to classical performance
