Course Description

This course will help you to better understand what is expected of you as a psychology graduate student expected to write a thesis and/or dissertation. You will learn about the importance of prioritizing the thesis/dissertation at least as much as coursework, as well as time management skills to balance the long-term goals of these large projects concurrently with short term goals like passing courses. Moreover, you will think through the process of writing a thesis and/or dissertation, seeing all the steps along the way. Lastly, you will design a potential thesis/dissertation, conduct a partial literature review, and produce a pre-proposal by the end of this course.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students will learn about:

1. What is involved in writing a thesis or dissertation
2. Time management during graduate school
3. How to design a manageable thesis/dissertation project
4. How to conduct a literature review
5. How to write a pre-proposal

This course will use D2L.

Instructional Methods

The course will revolve around D2L, primarily involving quizzes over readings and uploading video Discussion Posts.

Quizzes (20% of overall grade)

There are several assigned chapters to read, and to assess your retention and comprehension of this material, there will be regular quizzes. These are meant to be closed-book assessments of the knowledge acquired from the readings, and as such there will be a time limit that makes it difficult to look up answers. Each quiz deadline will be clearly visible in D2L. There will be no exams or tests beyond these quizzes.

Discussion Posts (36% of overall grade)

There will be several video discussion posts, with deadlines clearly visible in D2L.

Proposal Chapter 1 (Literature Review): 24% of final grade

At the end of the course you will upload this component of your proposal as a Word document. It must be 5-7 pages long, double-spaced and with 1-inch margins. This page range is for the content of the literature review, not title page or references.

Proposal Chapter 2 (Method and Planned Analyses): 20% of final grade

This component will actually be due prior to Chapter 1 (see schedule below), and also will be uploaded to D2L as a Word document. It should be 2-3 pages in length, double-spaced and with 1-inch margins.
