- 1. Identify key livestock diseases and parasites and understand their impact on health and productivity.
- 2. Explain the life cycles of common parasites and the epidemiology of major diseases.
- 3. Diagnose clinical signs and differentiate between various diseases and parasitic infections.
- 4. Develop effective control and prevention strategies, including vaccination, deworming, and biosecurity.

The material for this course will be primarily given by recorded PowerPoint lectures. PDF copies of those lectures will be made available to students before the lectures are posted. Additionally supplemental reading and links to online videos will be provided.

As a reminder and a warning, we are going to cover what would normally be covered in a 15 week course in 5 weeks. That means that you should be working more intensely and that we will cover a lot more material in a shorter period of time.

Assessments

2 exams will be given throughout the semester. Questions will include T/F, multiple choice, matching, and fill in the blank. In addition, a part of the exam may be "take home" or project based. Instructions and due dates for the additional work will be provided.

Quizzes will be given for every 2-3 lectures. Questions will include T/F, multiple choice, matching, and fill in the blank. One quiz will be dropped at the end of the semester.

Each week, a topic for discussion needs to be **posted by Friday night** relating to the reading assignments that elaborates or provides more depth over the material being covered. These posts need to be factual and in some cases it would be appropriate to cite a reference.

In addition, 3 **responses** or replies to other students posts are required for each week and are **due the following Friday**.

Late Work

Due dates for all assessments will be at least 7 days from the time they are opened and made available until the last week of the course. Late work may be submitted after the due date for a 10% penalty for everyday that is is late.
