Course Description (2 semester credit hours)

This course focuses on social, economic, political, cultural, ethicolegal, and historical factors affecting nursing. It provides a forum for exploration of issues and concerns, enabling the critical analysis and evaluation of their effect on advanced practice nursing.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of the course, the student will have been given the opportunity to:

1. Use a systematic process to explore current nursing issues (AACN Essentials Domains 2 & 4).

- Critically evaluate the social, economic, cultural, political, and historical influences on advanced practice nursing (AACN Essentials Domains 1 & 3).
- 3. Formulate opinions and beliefs about current nursing issues through the synthesis of current literature and research (AACN Essentials Domains 4 & 10).
- 4. Demonstrate the ability to support ideas in an organized, logical, and authoritative manner (AACN Essential Domain 4).
- 5. Analyze the use of political processes to create change in nursing (AACN Essential Domain 3).

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Using the learning management system, and using Microsoft Word, Microsoft Excel and PowerPoint.

Instructional Methods

This is an online course requiring students to complete assignments,

online activities and independent study to be successful. Course objectives will be met through individual study using suggested resources, active involvement in classroom activities, formal, and informal exchange of ideas with classmates and colleagues regarding specific topics as well as utilizing critical thinking skills. Teaching methods include lecture, seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, and assignments. While the professor will provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation, and demonstration of course objectives.

- Logging into the course website daily during the week

Successful completion of the assignments will enable the student to meet the student learning outcomes.

Paper Submissions:

Assessments

Short Papers (4) 40% (10% each)

Students are expected to read the assigned article and identify strengths and weaknesses noted. Students will develop a response to the article, which will include references to support ideas. Paper should be substantive and supported by assigned readings, other resources, and/or professional experience (Learning Outcomes #1-5).

Issues Presentation 100 points

Students are to develop a scholarly presentation on a selected topic of interest concerning APRN practice. The instructor must approve the topic. Follow the grading rubric provided (Learning Outcomes #1-5).

Issues Paper

100 points

Students are to develop a scholarly paper on a selected topic of interest about APRNs. The instructor must approve the topic. Follow the grading rubric provided (Learning Outcomes #1-5).
