COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a survey course designed to provide you with a synthetic overview of the major people and ideas that have shaped psychology. In short, this course will be a whirlwind tour of the key events in the history of psychology “from Adam” up through about the 1990s.

Student Learning Outcomes

- **Describe the Evolution of Psychological Thought:**
Students will be able to trace the historical development of psychological ideas from ancient philosophical roots (e.g., Plato, Aristotle) to the emergence of modern scientific psychology.
- **Identify Major Theories and Contributors:**
Students will accurately identify and explain the contributions of key figures (e.g., Descartes, Locke, Wundt, Freud, Skinner) and major schools of thought (e.g., structuralism, functionalism, behaviorism, psychoanalysis, humanism).
- **Analyze Historical Context:**
Students will analyze how historical, cultural, and scientific contexts influenced the development of psychological theories and practices.
- **Compare and Contrast Theoretical Perspectives:**
Students will critically compare major psychological paradigms and articulate their differing assumptions about mind, behavior, and scientific methodology.
- **Evaluate the Impact on Contemporary Psychology:**
Students will evaluate how historical developments in psychology continue to shape current practices, research priorities, and theoretical orientations in modern psychology.

Instructional Methods

This is an online course, which is not to be interpreted as self-paced. Rather, you are required to log on regularly (preferably every day) in order to succeed. Quizzes and Exams will be open for 2-3 days. **If you are unable to complete the exam in this time frame, you must contact me ahead of time to re-schedule.**
