Prerequisite

MATH 501 with a minimum grade of C. Students should review topics from prior courses as needed using old notes and books.

Course description

A graduate level course in statistical inference. Topics covered include: point estimation, interval estimation, hypothesis testing, Bayesian inference.

Learning Outcome

In this course, you will learn the following topics (Chapters 6–10 and 16 of Mathematical Statistics with Application (7th Ed.)):

- Sampling distributions and the Central Limit Theorem
- Estimation.
- Properties of estimation and methods of point estimation.
- Hypothesis testing.
- Linear models and estimation of parameters.
- Intro to Bayesian methods for inference (if time permits).

Calculator

For the exams and the quizzes, you may need to use a regular calculator. Even though, we mostly use \mathbf{R} for computational purposes.

Statistical Software

In this course, we will be using the statistical software **R**. It is freely available at the following website: https://www.r-project.org. Some of the exams, projects, and HW assignments may involve the statistical package **R**. The exams may involve also the interpretation of output from the statistical package **R**.

RStudio is a fancy interface for R. You can download it for free at https://www.rstudio.com/products/rstudio/download/. To use Rstudio you must download and install both R and Rstudio.

All exams including the final will be proctored on zoom. There will be no exception on this. Make sure you have zoom and camera available during the exams.

Midterms: There will be two midterms that weigh 50% of the overall grades. Midterms will be heavily based on the HW and problems solved on the notes and handouts. You must study notes/handouts for proofs and derivations.

Homework: There will be around 4–5 HW. **No** late submission will be allowed. Performance on your HW will directly or indirectly impact on your overall grade. If you use ChatGPT or any other online resources to solve your HW, be careful. Most of the times they are wrong!

Final: The final will be a comprehensive exam. But it will be heavily weighted on the recent topics. Only the topics from Midterms that are the most relevant will be covered in the final.
