COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Financial Auditing. Three semester hours. Principles and practices used by public accountants and internal auditors in examining financial statements and supporting data. Special emphasis is given to assets and liabilities. Prerequisite: Acct 322 or approval of faculty.

Course Objectives

This course is designed to provide an introduction to auditing. It is a study of techniques available for gathering, summarizing, analyzing and interpreting the data presented in financial statements and procedures used in verifying the fairness of the information. This course also covers ethical and legal considerations related to the accounting profession.

The successful student, upon completion of this course, will be expected to have achieved the following skills:


- 1. Explain the nature of auditing and assurance services including the impact of various statutes and regulations.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of basic auditing standards.
- 3. Demonstrate the linkage between financial statement information and audit objectives and procedures.
- 4. Identify the stages of an audit from planning to conclusion.

- 2. Reading the material is required. This course is different from any accounting course you have taken. It requires understanding the concepts of the auditing framework. There is very little discussion of debits and credits, nor are there many problems to work. The course will take a lot of time and effort. You are expected to complete all assigned work in a timely manner. An essential component to your successful completion of this class is to keep up with the material. Do not let yourself fall behind!
- Fair and Ethical Behavior: Please refrain from requesting special exceptions or that rules be "bent" for your situation. Course grades will reflect only the points earned during the semester, and all students will be treated and graded equally.

Student Responsibilities

Student success is most effective when you take responsibility for your own learning. What you get out of this course depends on your commitment to mastering the material and completing assignments and readings on time. My role as a teacher is to facilitate your learning process. As you study the text material for ACC 427, please note that you must understand the concepts of each chapter and be able to apply them. A suggested approach for each chapter in this course follows:

- Review the chapter's learning objectives in the front of each chapter.
- Review the chapter to become aware of the content and organization.
- Read the chapter. You have to read the textbook to succeed in this course!
- Carefully study the chapter's examples and illustrations; note that you must understand both the concepts and the applications.
- Complete the review questions throughout the chapter and the multiple-choice questions at the end of the chapter. Answers and solutions are provided in D2L.
- Note any questions that you have on the chapter's material. If you still have questions, please do not hesitate to ask me to better clarify these areas of difficulty.

ASSESSMENTS

Auditing is a very challenging topic and requires a lot of practice. The weekly assignments due on the schedule below are key parts of this course and critical to your success. These assignments are to be completed in <u>D2L</u> and <u>Connect</u>.

Homework

Read and outline the chapter before attempting homework. Homework assignments are worth 10 points each. The purpose of the graded homework is to practice concepts at a higher level of difficulty. Assignments are due in **Connect** by **9:00pm** on **Sunday** of that week. They have no time limit and <u>two</u> attempts. The lowest homework grade will be dropped.

Quizzes

Chapter quizzes provide feedback on how well you retained and mastered material in preparation for exams. Quizzes are worth 5 points each due in **Connect** every **Sunday** midnight with a duration of 30 minutes and <u>one</u> attempt. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped.

Project

Students will complete an audit project, worth 150 points in total. Instructions will be provided in D2L.

Exams

This course requires two midterm exams and a final exam, 50 points each. Refer to the Course Calendar for a detailed breakdown of exam dates.

Make-up exams will be considered only under extenuating circumstances. Extenuating circumstances include hospitalization, medical emergency, physical injury, or death of an immediate family member. Proof of the extenuating circumstance is required for make-up exam approval. Make-up exams will be scheduled within three days of approval.
