Course Description

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Gain an overview of the customs, organization, and academic disciplines within an institution of higher education.
- Familiarize oneself with the history, faculty, and programs of study within the university and the Department of Music at Texas A&M University-Commerce.
- 3. Increase one's effectiveness in practical matters such as time management, organization, and planning.
- 4. Develop general skills in critical thinking, creative problem solving, and other necessary tools/habits for success in college and beyond.
- 5. Learn and employ sound practices in research, study, and practice.
- 6. Gain a specific understanding of the conceptual and practical demands of the study of music.

Instructional Methods

Instruction will include lectures by the instructor, class discussions, and a series of guest speakers representing the music faculty and other divisions of the University.

Assessments

Assignments, Grading Policies, and Calculation of Final Average:

1. Participation and involvement in all class activities.

Engagement, participation, and a positive attitude are important in a course of this kind, as they are in any area of college and life. Students will participate in classroom discussions, presentations, and fieldtrips, the details of which will be announced by the instructor. It is especially important that first-year students begin the process of integrating into both the university and department's community of scholar/musicians.

2. Reading

It is imperative that students stay up to date on their assigned readings. Topics covered in the readings will often frame the activities/discussion in class. Please do not ignore this important component of the course.

Completion of written assignments.

Students must turn in all written assignments at the designated time to receive credit. Written assignments must follow the format given by the instructor to be accepted.

Final Examination.

A cumulative written final exam will be administered at the end of the semester. Content for the exam will be taken from readings and discussions throughout the course of the semester. Date of final is TBD.
