Course Description

Literacy and Instruction I: Three semester hours. This course focuses on the application of knowledge of the interrelated components of reading across all developmental stages, including oral language, phonological and phonemic awareness, the alphabet principle, word analysis, fluency, comprehension, vocabulary, written language, and expertise in reading instruction at the primary and intermediate/middle levels.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Apply knowledge of the interrelated components of reading across all developmental stages of oral and written language;
- 2. Demonstrate understanding of the role of oral language, phonological awareness, alphabetic principle, and concepts of print through systemic instruction that uses a variety of instructional methods at all levels of early childhood through grade 12.
- 3. Plans, implements, and monitors reading instruction in word identification, fluency, and comprehension skills and strategies that is responsive to individual students' strengths, needs, culture, and interests at all levels of early childhood through grade 12.
- 4. Design and uses a developmentally appropriate, culturally diverse, and research-based reading/literacy curriculum with a variety of appropriate reading materials at all levels of early childhood through grade 12.
- Makes connections between reading and writing development including the physical and cognitive processes involved in forming standard representations of text.
- 6. Recognizes and responds to the mental health needs of students.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed: Students should be prepared to use the learning management system (D2L Brightspace), Microsoft Office software, presentation and graphics programs such as Adobe Connect and Zoom.

Instructional Methods: this course is delivered 100% online. It includes lectures, inquiry-based discussions, an ongoing learning log, and individual assignments. Expect to spend an average of 14-16 hours per module completing readings and assignments.
