COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Honors colloquium is a weekly opportunity for Honors students to engage with speakers who present on topics about which they are passionate. This semester students will identify speakers to invite to speak to the class. Speakers can be nominated from the ETAMU community, students lived experience, alumni, or community members. A focus of our time together will be asking, what is your "why" and how might your answer inform a pathway to a future that is uniquely your own?

The course will provide opportunities to be motivated by other people's enthusiasm for their field, to be exposed to new ideas, and to chart your own path forward. This colloquium will also be a space in which you will practice telling others about your work and why it matters. The course will culminate with presentation of your thesis research at the Research Symposium on April 16. The purchase of books or other materials is not required for this course.

COURSE OVERVIEW

A. Attendance

- Students without documented schedule conflicts are allowed one unexcused absence with no penalty. Additional unexcused absences may result in failure of the course at the discretion of Dr. Webster Garrett.

B. Graded Items

To gain credit for HC 400, students are required to:

- Attend class and participate actively in class discussion.
- Prepare and publicly present a poster at the fall Honors College symposium showcase or to share an ePortfolio focused on synthesizing their Honors College experience. Further information will be provided in class. (Tentative date of showcase: November 18)
- Submit a minimum of 5 substantive reflections, 3 of which must focus on the class speakers. Further information about the reflection essays will be provided in class.
- Complete brief online modules and assignments.

C. Grading

Your grade in the course will be calculated as follows:
