

Course Description: This course introduces students to the principles and practices associated with sustainable agriculture from ecological, economic, social, and ethical perspectives.

Textbook

There is no official textbook for this class. We will mostly use references such as extension and other government agency bulletins, research articles, and videos. We will have a minimum of 12 weekly modules, and possibly up to 14, contingent upon how the course evolves. I will be building the course as we go and *may* stay as much as a week ahead of you. This is a new course, and I want to make sure that we address the most important/relevant topics. I know that importance and relevance are not always the same and may differ among individuals. If you get bored, feel shorted, or feel the topics are too advance, the information related to accessing the free online textbook we use in *AG 350 Introduction to Sustainable Agriculture* is provided below.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon completion of the course the student will be able to-

- a. **Learning Outcome 1:** Students will be able to demonstrate *knowledge* of the interdependence of global dynamics in our present food system as well as the need for more sustainable alternatives.
- b. **Learning Outcome 2:** Students will be able to *apply* knowledge of the principles of sustainable to the context of food production as evidenced through course related activities and assignments.
- c. **Learning Outcome 3:** Students will be able to view themselves as *engaged* change agents/educators within the context of sustainable food production and its relevance to people, profits, and planet.

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The following instructional objectives will guide course content to achieve these outcomes.

1. Recognize historical and contemporary issues of in agriculture and food systems in context of resource utilization and conservation.
2. Examine ecological, economic, and social impacts of farming methods.
3. Identify, analyze, and utilize various sources/types of information and:
 - a. Discuss *case studies* and examples of sustainable food production,
 - b. Distinguish between conventional and sustainable agriculture,
 - c. Determine relevant sources of training and professional development.
 - d. Recognize agencies and organizations supporting sustainable agriculture.
4. Compare/contrast concepts related to *agroecology*, *regenerative agriculture*, and *permaculture*.
5. Explore factors associated with *soil health* and *soil improvement*.
6. Review training materials and create assessment items.
7. Develop and deliver an informative presentation.
8. Consider the *human conditions* associated with labor in farming/food processing.
9. Recognize the role of livestock/poultry/fish in sustainable agriculture.
10. Identify sources of influence in the development of regulations and policies affecting the production, distribution, and management of food, agriculture, and natural resources systems.

Class Attendance and Participation in Discussions

Students are expected to discuss experiences and observations, as well as ask questions. Being in attendance is only part of the learning process. By discussing issues and asking questions, you will reinforce learning through a multi-sensory approach. Your attendance and *effective listening* are also necessary for participation in the *peer review* of the team presentations and individual speeches. Some discussions will be online in D2L.

Introductory Video

Student will prepare and submit a 30-45 second video introducing themselves in D2L.

Research Brief (2)

Students will select and read two research article related to some aspect of sustainable agriculture and summarize key points in 2-3 paragraphs. In the final paragraph, the student will describe how this research relates to one or more topics presented/discussed in class and whether or not the research could be put into practice in Northeast Texas.

Poster Presentations

Each student will create a *poster presentation* elaborating on a production practice or process that makes farming more sustainable. Presentations will be submitted in D2L.

Review of Training Materials and Creation of Relevant Assessment Items

Each student will be assigned a training reference that may be used in the Sustainable Agriculture Career Development Event for FFA (and possibly/eventually 4-H). The student will review the material per professor directions and compose 10 multiple-choice exam items over the material assigned. The student sill also compose a one-page review of the reference regarding its potential relevance and a training/learning tool.

The research summaries and presentation, should be written in a format compatible with the *American Psychological Association (APA) Manual for Publication*, 7th edition. A synopsis and tutorial on scientific writing, including the use of APA format is available from the Online Writing Lab at Purdue University (<http://owl.english.purdue.edu/>). Personal face-to-face assistance with editing and format suggestions is available from the on-campus Writing Center at TAMU-Commerce.
