## **Catalogue Description of the Course**

As the foundation course for those planning to enter student affairs work in higher education, this course offers students opportunities to examine the historical and contemporary role and scope of college student personnel services. Provides students with in-depth understanding of major theories of student development and the application of these theories to student development practice.

#### **General Course Information**

This course is a required course for Student Affairs Practice in Higher Education:
Counseling program option. As an elective, it is open to undergraduate, doctoral and masters' students in any major. It is particularly valuable to students planning to enter the fields of college or university administration or teaching. This course is designed to acquaint the student with the role and scope of the college or university student personnel worker through lectures, class discussions, committee work, and individual study.

Materials will focus on the history and philosophies of higher education, student services programs, pertinent research and research forms, student affairs practice, current issues and future trends in higher education, and student development models and theories.

#### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

## **COURSE OUTLINE / CALENDAR**

**Examination (25 points each)** – The first examination will cover the syllabus, and the code of ethics. The examination will consist of multiple-choice questions.

Exam Due: September 7, 2025

Personal Reflection Paper: (25 points) Critical reflections about the content of the course and your experiences are fundamental to transmitting new knowledge. Students must submit a 3-5-page reflection paper discussing these key factors and considering how to effectively address them: 1). You should provide some background information about yourself (e.g., your family, status, etc.); 2). The specifics of your educational background (e.g., the institutions attended, the reasons for attending them, the degrees you have or will earn); 3). In what ways you have utilized or not utilized student affairs services during your postsecondary educational journey; 4). Provide relevant information about the needs of students in higher education today (including outside of the classroom); 5). Indicate and explain at least three areas of improvement that colleges can make in terms of student affairs today. This paper must be in APA format 7th ed, which means Times New Roman font, size 12, and 1" margins all around, etc. Please answer all questions fully, 5-8 sentences per question is appropriate and minimum of five resources from text or peer reviewed journal. (\*Wikipedia is not an appropriate resource). Please make the response to each question a new paragraph using proper headings. Make sure that you proof your paper and that it is written at a college level. Please upload it to D2L. Please note that I will not accept late assignments.

# Research Paper: (25 points)

Each student will complete a research paper for the course. Topics will be chosen by the student from the topics covered in the text and given final approval by the course instructor. You may choose any topic if it is relevant to the course. At least (Five) outside sources must be used on the paper. It must be at least ten written pages, plus a cover page and reference page, making it no less than twelve pages. (APA STYLE) (DUE: November 9, 2025)

Any form of plagiarism is NOT tolerated. Plagiarism is not just copying someone else's work word for word. If you fail to successfully paraphrase, your paper WILL be flagged for plagiarism. Assignments with a plagiarism percentage of 13% of higher will receive a zero on the assignment.

Example of plagiarism:

"The sky was blue, and ocean went on for miles."

"The sky was a shade of blue, and the ocean continued for miles" (This sentence will flag for plagiarism because of the similarity)

"Blue was a fitting color to describe the sky, and the water remained forever." (This is an example of successful rewording)
