Course description

This graduate course fulfills the research requirement for those students in the Spanish MA non-thesis option (36 hours) track. In this class, students will complete their comprehensive exam—a critical annotated bibliography essay—, and develop, write, and publish their final project, an individual research work on a topic agreed upon with their advisor..

Student Learning Outcomes: Students who successfully complete the course will:

1. Find, evaluate, and critically analyze appropriate secondary sources. Appropriate sources will include: *peer-reviewed journal articles, monographs, and book chapters published by academic presses*. Attention should be paid to dates of publication in order to balance current and foundational research.

2. Develop a bibliographic research project demonstrating critical understanding of frameworks, core topics and research processes in the selected area (language pedagogy, cultural studies or linguistics).
3. Plan, develop and write an academic report in Spanish, in ways that reflect the conventions and tools associated with academic researched writing. This includes deep understanding of ethical use of sources, and the ability to integrate summaries, paraphrasing, and quotations with adequate references.
4. Deliver an academic lecture in Spanish, presenting the research project to a specialized audience.

These learning outcomes will be measured through three main activities: *an annotated bibliographic examination, a final research report, and an academic oral presentation of the project.*

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness:

In order to measure the level of compliance with the university's Institutional Effectiveness guidelines, I will collect some of the ungraded materials you will produce for the class. These materials will be part of a portfolio created on your behalf and will be measured to ensure that our program "promotes practices that result in higher student academic achievement; an enhanced student experience; aligned and transparent decisions; and readily available information for improvement, accountability, and accreditation" (see "Department of Institutional Effectiveness," www.tamuc.edu/aboutus/institutionalEffectiveness/default.aspx). This is solely an assessment of program effectiveness and in no way affects students' course grades or GPAs.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

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Minimal Technical Skills

Students in this course are expected to:

- a. access, navigate and use the diverse tools included in the course shell (MyLeoOnline - D2L). This includes how to turn-in assignments, how to upload video and audio recordings, how to participate and respond in the discussion boards, and how to access and use the quiz tool. - b. manage ETAMU Library resources for academic research. See the *Resources* folder for details;

GRADING

Activities & assessments

1. **Comprehensive exam (annotated bibliography report).** The comprehensive examination consists of three open questions regarding the main subject area and specific topic the student has selected for the final project. The questions are designed to measure student's general knowledge of the study area, ability to conduct scholarship research, and ability to write in Spanish at the academic level. The general questions will deal with 1) theoretical framework of the project and its connections to the fields of Peninsular/Latin-American Literature, Spanish Pedagogy, Spanish Linguistics or related areas; 2) presentation of relevant annotated bibliography; and 3) the project's relevance, main objectives, and methodology. The exam will be taken over the weekend, on the indicated dates, at any location convenient to the student. The student will receive a PDF document with the questions on Friday 8:00am, and will return the completed exam the following Monday at 8:00am via email (with copy to the Advisor and Program Director). See "Spanish MA Examination Rules" for more information.
2. **Research paper:** During this course, you will elaborate a research project focusing on a topic of interest agreed upon with your advisor. You need to elaborate a specific research question related to a particular subject in the general areas of Spanish literature, Hispanic Cultural Studies, or Hispanic Linguistics & Pedagogy. Then you need to critically review and integrate pertinent literature (which has been selected and annotated for the Comprehensive Exam), analyze corresponding data, and summarize and discuss your findings in a standardized style (MLA, APA or Chicago) formatted paper. You will present an initial draft for discussion with your advisor, and present the final version at the end of the semester. See Schedule for details.
3. **Academic Presentation:** You will present the results of your research project following the conventional structure of a conference presentation; the presentation will last about 20 minutes and should not be read; the presenter can use card notes or a PPoint to support the delivery, but the reading should be kept at minimum. The presentation will consist of a brief introduction to the topic, a description of methodology, previous literature, results obtained in your research, and a critical discussion of the conclusions.

***Please note that all assignments will be graded 'S' (Satisfactory) or 'U' (Unsatisfactory).**

- *General Discussion Board*: Located in the “General Resources” folder, this board is open to all participants; anyone can post a comment, question or suggestion related or unrelated to the course. All students are encouraged to participate and post responses; I will visit this board regularly.

2. Feedback and assessment

You will be received detailed feedback on the “fichas” and the two multimodal projects (draft and final version) 72 hours after the assignment due date (see the ‘Tentative Course Schedule’ for details).

3. Syllabus Change Policy

The syllabus is a guide. Circumstances and events, such as student progress, may make it necessary for the instructor to modify the syllabus during the semester. Any changes made to the syllabus will be announced in advance.

4. Withdraws & Incomplete grade.

A student may drop a course by logging into his/her myLeo account and clicking on the hyperlink labeled “Drop a class” from among the choices found under the myLeo section of the web page.

I reserve the right to drop a student from the course administratively for excessive absences or violations of the [Student Code of Conduct](#).

Incomplete grades (a grade of “X”) are granted only under rare and extraordinary circumstances which are fully documented; students requesting an incomplete grade should contact the instructor as soon as possible, provide all pertinent documentation, and sign the ‘X’ grade contract which details the coursework they need to complete to pass the class.
