Course Description

Principles of Macroeconomics is an introduction to the study of the aggregate economy. The course will introduce the basics (fundamentals) of economic theory and reasoning. Moreover, this course will primarily focus on understanding, measuring, and analyzing macroeconomic activity and the role of fiscal and monetary policy in the economy. Topics include major schools of economic thought; aggregate supply and demand; economic measures, fluctuations, and growth; money and banking; stabilization techniques; and international macroeconomics. If you do not know any of the above, then you are in the right course.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Define and interpret key macroeconomic concepts, including GDP, inflation, unemployment, and balance of payments, using aggregate economic accounts and standard terminology.
2. Analyze and compare theories of long-run economic growth and short-run business cycle fluctuations, demonstrating an ability to connect models to real-world contexts.

3. Evaluate and apply monetary and fiscal policy tools in the context of stabilization, international trade, and long-term growth, identifying trade-offs between competing socioeconomic goals.
4. Interpret and critique macroeconomic data and media reports from newspapers, periodicals, and online sources, assessing their accuracy and relevance.
5. Formulate and defend policy recommendations for addressing macroeconomic issues (e.g., inflation, unemployment, trade deficits), supported by theoretical frameworks and empirical evidence.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students should be able to log in to the university's Learning Management System (LMS) and Pearson MyEconLab, submit assignments electronically, download and upload files, and communicate through email. Basic proficiency with word processing (Word), spreadsheets (Excel), and internet browsing is required. Students should also be able to troubleshoot common issues such as login errors or browser compatibility problems.

Instructional Methods

This course is delivered fully online through Pearson MyEconLab and the LMS. Instructional methods include textbook readings, MyEconLab problem sets, online quizzes, and exams. Learning is reinforced through interactive exercises and applied assignments within MyEconLab. The course emphasizes connecting macroeconomic theories to real-world applications using data-driven exercises and media-based examples. Faculty guidance will be provided through announcements, assignment feedback, and virtual office hours.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Students are expected to log in regularly to the LMS and MyEconLab, keep up with the assigned readings, and complete quizzes and assignments by the posted deadlines. Staying current with the weekly schedule is critical, as late submissions may not be accepted. Students should dedicate consistent time each week to reviewing materials, practicing MyEconLab problems, and preparing for exams. Time management, organization, and proactive communication with the instructor are essential for success.

MyLab Economics

All course assignments will be completed through Pearson MyLab Economics. Make sure to follow the provided registration instructions carefully. **All MyLab work must be completed by December 8, 2025.**

MyLab Economics Homework

Homework assignments will be assigned through MyLab Economics. These are designed to provide practice with key concepts and problem-solving. Homework is graded and must be completed by the posted deadlines. **Must be completed by December 8, 2025**

MyLab Economics Quizzes & Tests

Quizzes will be administered online through MyLab Economics and will cover specific chapters. Quizzes are timed and must be completed once opened. Tests will also be completed through MyLab Economics. **Must be completed by December 8, 2025**

First Two Tests (Tests 1 and 2)

The first two tests are **non-comprehensive**. Each test will cover only the chapters assigned since the previous test. Tests will consist of **25–30 multiple-choice questions**, including both conceptual and numerical problems.

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Final Exam

The final exam is **comprehensive**, covering all chapters assigned during the semester. The exam will be completed through MyLab Economics and will include a mix of conceptual and applied multiple-choice questions.
