Course Description

The purpose of this course is a) to investigate various definitions and forms of deviant behavior in their proper cultural and historical context, b) to examine research methodologies used in sociological inquiry that seeks to understand deviant behavior, c) to provide possible and plausible theoretical explanations on the causes of deviant behavior and d) to examine the societal and individual impact of deviant behavior. The course is organized thematically around salient social issues, encompassing multiple concepts from culture, mass media, identity, criminology, and organizational studies.

Assigned readings and class lectures will introduce and critique the provided material while also exploring their empirical findings and policy implications. The course will include a pervasive emphasis on developing critical thinking skills when evaluating sociological theory, research, and public policy.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Develop an introspective and sociological perspective on deviant behavior.
- 2. Explore and critically analyze major theoretical perspectives on deviant behavior.
- 3. Explore and critically examine specific types of deviant behavior through germane social issues.
- 4. Develop and foster critical thinking skills and the enhancement of the students' abilities to express their ideas in their communication.

Assessments

All course writing assignments will be submitted online through D2L using plagiarism software. Papers should be in <u>Times New Roman</u>, size 12 font, one-inch margins and <u>double-spaced</u>.

Course Journal (20%, 5 entries each worth 4%):

Throughout the semester, students will be assigned five journal prompts with topics based on video lectures and readings from the current and/or previous week. Students will be required to develop a written entry (roughly 500 words), which will be uploaded to D2L. Successful journal entries will be thoughtful, introspective about how the topic relates to their own personal experiences and attempt to make connections between the course material and their own ideas. Other students will *not* have access to a student's personal journal, and its content will only be viewed by the instructor of record. Each journal entry is graded on a 5-point scale and comprises 5% of the total grade in the course.

Each prompt on a journal week (see weekly course schedule at the end of this document for specific dates) will be released Monday morning. Students will then have until 11:59PM the following Sunday night to submit their entry.

<u>How to access course journal</u>: the online student journal can be found by accessing the "Assignments" tab on the course D2L.

Interview Assignment (15%):

The interview assignment will ask students to conduct and transcribe qualitative interviews on deviance with valued others. Afterwards, the students will produce a written essay that attempts to make connections between deviance theories and the findings from their interviewees (e.g., show how a layperson is using deviance theories without necessarily knowing it).

Punished Reading Quiz (5%): To ensure that students are progressing through the course text, an online reading and comprehension assessment will be given via D2L approximately midway through the semester. It will include 10-15 multiple-choice, fill-in-the-blank, and short answer questions.

Film Analysis (Tough Guise) Paper (20%): Students will be conducting a sociological analysis of Jackson Katz' documentary *Tough Guise*, which systematically explores the relationship between pop culture and masculinity in the United States. In doing so, students will have an opportunity to both assess and apply deviance theories discussed throughout the course. The film is available to watch on both Kanopy and YouTube. After viewing the documentary, students will produce a 2–3-page essay that explores the content of the film through the prism of the theories of social deviance discussed in class. A fuller assignment description and grading rubric will be provided on D2L.

Final Analysis Paper (Rios' Punished, 20%): The final assignment for the course is a critical analysis essay of Rios' *Punished*. Students will be given wide latitude to determine the theme and direction of their final paper but are strongly encouraged to incorporate course theories and make cross-application from semester readings. Students will also be required to cite a minimum of two peer-reviewed, academic sources that support their overall argument. A sample outline of a potential paper will be disseminated to help students structure their assessment.

Midterm Exam (20%): One online exam will be administered (on Brightspace/D2L) in this course. The midterm will be graded on a 100-point scale and include 40-50 multiple-choice, true/false, and fill-in-the-blank questions. The exam will cover the assigned readings, uploaded lecture videos, and assigned multimedia. As an online course, students will need access to reliable internet services and a quiet work environment conducive to test taking. The exam and access password will be made available online on the D2L system on OCTOBER16 at 9AM. Students will have until 11:59PM to complete it. Once a student opens the exam, they will have one hour (60 minutes) to complete all the questions. More detailed information on the procedure for taking online tests on this course can be found on D2L under ONLINE EXAMS in the CONTENT folder.

Makeup Exam Policy: I totally understand that life happens. Students that experience exceptional circumstances which cause them to miss a scheduled exam should contact me ASAP. Students that have a university approved absence or otherwise produce written documentation regarding their absence will be scheduled for a make-up time. Students that have not reported their absence or spoken to me within 2 days of the exam will be considered unexcused and receive a "0" score for that exam.

Classroom Guidelines

Electronic Device Policy: Please refrain from the use of electronic devices during class, as it is distracting not only to you, but also to your instructor and peers. Laptops should only be used for note taking unless it is part of the instructor assignment and discussion for the class day.

Classroom Civility, Respect and Tolerance: University study is largely about exposure to a diverse range of worldviews and lived experiences. This course relies on challenging and critiquing deeply held societal beliefs over a wide range of sensitive topics. Students should engage in discourse with other students and the instructor respectfully. My classroom is predicated on principles of mutual respect and students are expected to exhibit this same respect for the diversity of ideas. Forms of incivility towards other students or the instructor will not be tolerated.

Instructor Error: Because instructor errors can and do occur, students should keep an extra copy of any work they submit. In addition, make sure to keep and safeguard graded assignments and tests until final course grades have been posted.

Course Policies

Access to Grades: All grades will be available in D2L. Please note that I am unable to furnish any information about grades or student status via e-mail or telephone. This is considered a violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), even with student permission or at student request. Verify your D2L grades often. Discuss grade posting errors/omissions with me immediately.

Borderline Grades: Students will not be awarded extra points at the discretion of the instructor. Be aware at the outset that this course has a firm policy against grade "bumping". However, students will be automatically rounded to a higher letter grade at the .5 threshold (i.e., 89.5% is an A).

Incompletes: Grades of "incomplete" are given only under rare circumstances when students provide detailed documentation of a significant crisis (e.g., serious illness of the student or death in the immediate family) near the end of the semester and which render them unable to finish the course. Incomplete grades will not be given under any other circumstances. Students with circumstances negatively affecting their class performance should discuss the situation with me immediately so that we can identify and implement strategies for managing the problem(s).
