# **Course Description**

This course provides an examination of research literature relative to the process of designing, implementing, and evaluating curricula and instructional strategies. Prerequisite: Doctoral level standing or consent of instructor.

# **Student Learning Outcomes**

- Engage in group discussions by analyzing, designing, and evaluating information within the texts, supplementary readings, and class activities.
- Compare and contrast different theories, research, and philosophical stances which address the organization of learning activities in relation to curriculum and instructional activities

- Identify and elaborate on, both verbally and in writing, the contextual factors and diversities that affect the learner and the learning environment.
- Demonstrate the ability to read and synthesize existing professional literature related to curriculum theory and instructional design; and, analyze and evaluate research designs and findings.
- Write academically using APA style (7<sup>th</sup> edition)
- Plan and carry out a curriculum evaluation project related to his/her current work assignment and which demonstrates the integration of best practices based on new ideas learned through the class activities, readings, and discussions.

## COURSE REQUIREMENTS

#### Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Familiarity with Zoom, Google Docs, Microsoft Word, and PDFs are needed for this course.

## **Instructional Methods**

This course reflects a sociocultural and constructivist approach to learning. Class time will be collaborative in which students will discuss, reflect, and share within small groups and whole class. This class is designed to follow a HyFlex learning format/model.

# What is HyFlex?

HyFlex combines the terms "hybrid" and "flexible." Hybrid learning refers to learning that integrates complementary face-to-face (synchronous) and online learning (asynchronous) experiences in service of intended learning objectives (see CTL's guide on <u>Blended Learning</u> to learn more). All students in a hybrid course are expected to undergo the same combination of online and in-person activities. In contrast, the "flexible" aspect of HyFlex is that students are given choice in how they participate in the course and engage with material in the mode that works best for them over the course and from session to session.

In HyFlex courses, students can choose from one of three participation paths:

- 1. Participate in face-to-face synchronous class sessions in-person (in a classroom)
- 2. Participate in face-to-face class sessions via video conference (e.g., Zoom)
- 3. Participate fully asynchronously via D2L (this option should be used sparingly, as it restricts members of the class to engage with peers).

A HyFlex class makes class meetings and materials available so that students can access them online or in-person, during or after class sessions. All students, regardless of the path taken, will achieve the same learning objectives.

## **Synchronous Class Meetings**

This course uses an ungrading approach to support your growth as a scholar-practitioner. Rather than traditional point-based grading, the emphasis is on meaningful engagement, critical reflection, and intellectual risk-taking. The goal is to shift the focus from earning grades to deepening understanding, developing scholarly identity, and contributing to the learning community.

## **Key Principles of This Ungrading Policy:**

- **Feedback over scores:** You will receive feedback designed to help you reflect on your work, deepen your thinking, and make purposeful revisions.
- Self-assessment: At designated points in the semester, you will complete
  reflective self-assessments in which you evaluate your own progress, identify
  areas for growth, and propose a course grade based on your learning and
  contributions.
- Dialogue about learning: You are encouraged to schedule one-on-one checkins with me throughout the term to discuss your reflections, challenges, and goals.
- Revision and iteration: You will have the opportunity to revise major assignments based on feedback. Growth is expected and celebrated.

At the end of the course, you will submit a final self-evaluation (prompt provided), including a proposed course grade (A, B, C, etc.) supported by evidence from your work, reflections, and participation. I will review your self-assessment holistically and will be in conversation with you if there is any need for further discussion.

This policy is grounded in trust, respect, and a shared commitment to learning. If at any point the ungrading process feels unclear or unhelpful, please reach out.

Any use of such software must be documented. Any undocumented use of such software constitutes an instance of academic dishonesty (plagiarism).

For this course, it may be appropriate for you to use Al like ChatGPT for some portions of an assignment. Appropriate uses may be to edit writing, create content, and/or generate ideas. It is not appropriate to use Al to create full assignments, However, you may discover uses that are relevant and appropriate. Anytime you use Al in this course, you must include the transcription of the conversation as an appendix or attachment to the assignment or discussion. If used, you must also directly reference how you used Al in your discussion post or the assignment submission. This allows for transparency and avoidances of plagiarism. It also helps me to determine if it was a legitimate use of Al for the purposes of this course. If for some reason I do not think it was appropriate, then I will communicate that with you and allow you a chance to resubmit.
