Course Description

This course continues students' exploration of research in criminal justice established in CJ575 (Research Methods). In this course, students are exposed to different methods of data collection and the principles of data analysis. Emphasis will also be placed on teaching students how to interpret data as presented in published reports, articles, and books.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Evaluate the strengths and limitations of various data analysis techniques, justifying the selection of specific methods based on research questions and data characteristics
- 2. Synthesize interpreted data and analytical findings into clear, well-supported conclusions and recommendations relevant to the research problem.
- 3. Critique the data interpretation and reporting practices in published research, identifying potential sources of bias, misrepresentation, or methodological error.

Assessments

Assignments and exams may be made up without penalty if they are missed due to an excused absence.

Midterm Quiz (10% of total grade)

During Week 4, students will be responsible for completing a 10-question quiz through D2L (quizzes tab). Students will be provided with a review guide that will identify the topics that will be covered. To accommodate work and family schedules, the midterm quiz will be available for 48-72 hours.

Metanalysis Assignment (15%)

A meta-analysis attempts to statistically analyze a large collection of studies on a topic for the purpose of integrating the different findings into a coherent story (Berman & Parker, 2002). Students will be given a concise metanalytic study on the correlates of citizen satisfaction with law enforcement and be tasked with summarizing the findings for lay people, with a specific emphasis on identifying remaining questions and issues (critique).

All course writing assignments will be submitted online through D2L and utilize plagiarism software. Papers should be in <u>Times New Roman</u>, size 11 font, one- inch margins and double-spaced. Late assignments will be accepted but will be deducted 10 points for each day (or part of the day) they are late (without approved documentation).

Data Interpretation Worksheet (15%)

Students will complete a guided worksheet that asks them to accurately interpret and report findings from peer-reviewed research. Students should cross-reference chapters 15-16 of the course text to help facilitate this process.

Survey Design Assignment (30%)

Students will utilize their research topic/question established in CJ 575 to develop a professional survey. Based on your previous work, you should have completed a literature review and an annotated bibliography.

As discussed extensively in Chapter 8 of the textbook, survey design can be a difficult task, with many young researchers failing to address their research questions or biasing their own questions. Refer to this chapter consistently as you progress through this assignment.

Students will develop 12-15 survey questions, including a justification as to why it exists, how it was worded, and why it maintains reliability and validity.

Research Report/Executive Summary (30%)

This assignment requires students to synthesize their research topic into a concise, professional Executive Summary. The goal is to utilize data interpretation and analysis skills to distill complex research into a document immediately useful to policymakers, agency heads, or stakeholders who

require a quick, clear understanding of the project's key takeaways, supporting evidence, and actionable recommendations. A full rubric will be available on D2L.

Makeup Exam Policy: I totally understand that life happens. Students that experience exceptional circumstances which cause them to miss a scheduled exam should contact me ASAP. Students that have a university approved absence or otherwise produce written documentation regarding their absence will be scheduled for a make-up time. Students that have not reported their absence or spoken to me within 2 days of the exam will be considered unexcused and receive a "0" score for that exam.

Classroom Guidelines

Classroom Civility, Respect and Tolerance: University study is largely about exposure to a diverse range of worldviews and lived experiences. This course relies on challenging and critiquing deeply held societal beliefs over a wide range of sensitive topics. Students should engage in discourse with other students and the instructor respectfully. My classroom is predicated on principles of mutual respect and students are expected to exhibit this same respect for the diversity of ideas. Forms of incivility towards other students or the instructor will not be tolerated.

Instructor Error: Because instructor errors can and do occur, students should keep an extra copy of any work they submit. In addition, make sure to keep and safeguard graded assignments and tests until final course grades have been posted.

Borderline Grades: Students will not be awarded extra points at the discretion of the instructor. Be aware at the outset that this course has a firm policy against grade "bumping". However, students will be automatically rounded to a higher letter grade at the .5 threshold (i.e., 89.5% is an A).

Incompletes: Grades of "incomplete" are given only under rare circumstances when students provide detailed documentation of a significant crisis (e.g., serious illness of the student or death in the immediate family) near the end of the semester and which render them unable to finish the course. Incomplete grades will not be given under any other circumstances. Students with circumstances

negatively affecting their class performance should discuss the situation with me immediately so that we can identify and implement strategies for managing the problem(s).
