Course Description

This course will examine the variables which affect the perceptions, beliefs, and behaviors of the microcultures which comprise our population. This course will include, but will not be limited to, culture as a function of socioeconomic status, religion, gender, language, age, exceptionality, geographical origins and ethnicity. Additionally, this course will include information relating to these issues in a global context.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify psychological and sociocultural factors that influence the experiences of diverse populations in both U.S. and global contexts.
- 2. Analyze how intersecting identities (e.g., race, gender, class, sexuality, ability) shape individual and group outcomes in psychological and educational settings.

- 3. Evaluate systems of privilege and oppression and their impact on mental health, educational access, and social equity.
- 4. Demonstrate empathy and cultural sensitivity in written reflections and class discussions about diverse lived experiences.
- 5. Apply multicultural psychological theories and research to real-world case studies and current events.
- 6. Locate and summarize scholarly research on multicultural issues using academic databases, and correctly format findings using APA style.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Research Participation:

A goal of this class is to help you become familiar with psychological research. One way to obtain this goal is to have you participate in research studies. Participating in research studies contributes to students and faculty at East Texas A&M, your understanding of how research is conducted, and human knowledge in general. All students in this class will be required to participate in the psychology department's participant pool or complete alternative assignments (see me for more information on alternative assignments). Students must complete a total of 6 experiment credits. However, if you complete your first 4 experiment credits without any "no-shows" you will receive 2 free punctual participant credits. In other words, if you show up to your experiments on time you will only need to complete 4 experiment credits. When you first sign into the experiment management system (EMS) you will be asked to take a prescreen. The prescreen takes about 20 minutes to complete. If you complete the prescreen in the first two weeks of the semester you will receive ½ free experiment credit. This can be combined with later experiments that are worth \(\frac{1}{2} \) credit.

If you fail to complete this portion of the class your grade will be lowered by one full grade. In effect, if you have an 'A' in the class but fail to complete your research participation (either through participating in research studies, alternative assignments, or a mixture of both) your final grade in the class will be a 'B.' More information about participating in research, such as how to log in to the EMS, is given at the end of this syllabus.

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

All course materials (e.g., PowerPoint lectures, assignments, articles, etc.) will be uploaded to D2L each week, and all assignments will be done through D2L.

Instructional Methods

This class will be in-person with supplemental learning and assignments delivered to you online, using the MyLeoOnline/D2L instructional system that is available to you through East Texas A&M University.

This is not a self-paced course. There is a very specific and scheduled format that you will follow for the course. All assignments and quizzes are to be completed according to the posted schedule. You are required to complete all assignments, quizzes, and other course requirements. Assignments that are submitted past the deadline dates that are listed in the D2L will be submitted for partial credit, or no credit if they are submitted very late.

You will need to sign online often to check your campus email as well as your PSY397 D2L website to work on this course. New topics will generally open every few days, and the schedule for the topics will be available on D2L the first day of class.

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

- 1. Attend lectures. You will probably hear this from all of your professors, but it is true. Having the ability to ask questions when you think of them is immensely helpful in the learning process.
- 2. Participate. I will not lie and tell you this is easy, talking in front of others can be intimidating. I hope to foster a classroom of ease where you feel excited to contribute to the topic and ask questions along the way!
- 3. Read the assigned material. I know you are busy students, and I will try not to assign to much reading. If you feel you do not have the time to dedicate to reading a whole chapter than skim it as that is better than nothing.
- 4. Communicate your needs. I am here for you to help you succeed in this class. I want you all to learn everything that you can in this course while also taking care of yourselves. If something comes up, please let me know.

CULTURAL IDENTITY REFLECTION PAPER (150 points)

As part of this course, you will complete a Cultural Identity Reflection Paper in which you will examine your own identity development and explore any personal biases through the lens of course concepts and relevant research. This assignment is intended to help you critically reflect on how your cultural background, life experiences, and social identities (e.g., race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation, religion, ability, socioeconomic status) have shaped your perspectives and how these relate to broader themes in the psychology of diverse populations.

The paper should be **3–4 full pages** in length (not including title or reference pages), typed in **APA format** (12 pt. Times New Roman font, double-spaced, 1" margins). You must incorporate **at least 3 peer-reviewed journal articles** to support your reflections or to illustrate a specific issue related to identity development, cultural psychology, or systemic inequality. These sources should go beyond course materials to demonstrate your ability to integrate and apply outside scholarship. Wikipedia and similar non-scholarly sources are not acceptable.

If you are unsure about your paper topic or would like help refining your focus, please reach out to me.

25 points will come from submitting the topic you are interested in writing the paper over in the correct discussion board before or on the due date. Another 25 points will be from the submission of the 3 peer-reviewed journal articles you are planning on using cited as you will cite them on your reference pages in the correct assignment section before or on its due date. The final 100 points will be from the submission of the term paper itself.

EXAMS (Mid-term and Final: 200 points each, 400 points total)

There will be two online exams. The exams will be cumulative, be prepared to see any of the topics that we have covered up to that point on the exam. There will be no make-up exams, if you have to miss an exam contact me **BEFORE** the day of the exam and we will arrange something together.

QUIZZES (50 points each, 400 points total)

There will be eleven online quizzes, the lowest three grades will be dropped and the highest eight will be used for this section. The quizzes will be covering any chapter(s)

since the previous quiz. If you have to miss a quiz, please let me know **BEFORE** the day of the quiz and we will arrange something together.

FIELD-BASED EXPERIENCE (50 points)

Participate in a Field-Based Experience (FBE), maintain the agreed-upon schedule, complete a minimum of 16 clock hours of documented time observing in the assigned school, be evaluated on the work experiences by the assigned mentor teacher(s) in the school, and complete the (3) required FBE forms (Log Sheet, Evaluation Form, FBE Reflection).

EXTRA CREDIT (Up to 50 points)

Students will have the opportunity to earn extra credit at various points throughout the semester. Approved options for extra credit may include participation in additional research studies beyond the course requirement and the completion of article summaries. Further details will be provided in class and on the course website.
