Course Description

ENG 1301 introduces students to writing as an extended, complex, recursive process and prepares them for English 1302, which focuses on the forms and structures of argument and approaching multiple audiences. Students will write weekly, focusing on essay organization, development, close reading, summarizing, and analysis of expository texts.

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Read, interpret, and analyze print and digital texts.
- 2. Apply writing strategies to draft, revise, and edit major writing tasks.
- 3. Apply and evaluate appropriate syntax, grammar, punctuation, and spelling.
- 4. Apply and evaluate voice, style, tone, and audience awareness in writing.
- 5. Compose new writing in multiple genres that is focused, coherent, and developed.
- 6. Collaborate with peers to plan, develop, and revise projects.
