COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course addresses the origin and development of the Texas Constitution, structure and powers of state and local government, federalism and inter-governmental relations, political participation, the election process, public policy, and the political culture of Texas.

THCB Required Learning Outcomes: Students will master 8 THCB Required Learning Outcomes

1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
6. Analyze the state and local election process.
7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
8. Analyze issues, policies and political culture of Texas.

Student Learning Outcomes for the Core Curriculum:

1. **Critical Thinking:** Students will be able to analyze, evaluate, or solve problems when given a set of circumstances, data, texts, or art.
2. **Communication:** In written, oral, and/or visual communication, A&M-Commerce students will communicate in a manner appropriate to audience and occasion, with an evident message and organizational structure.
3. **Personal Responsibility:** Students will understand and practice academic honesty.
4. **Social Responsibility:** Students will demonstrate an understanding of societal and/or civic issues.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS & ASSIGNMENTS

- I. Three tests (25 multiple choice/true-false questions per test) on content from textbook and Powerpoint slides. Tests will be taken in class. A review sheet for each test will be handed out one week prior to the exam.
- II. Weekly chapter response: 100-150 words comment on a chapter of the textbook, due as a hard copy on the Wednesday after we talked about the chapter in class. You will receive a prompt for the chapter response or you can suggest for a topic that you would like to address.
- III. Short research paper, 1200 words +/- 10%, on a research question that you will develop in class.
- IV. Weekly reading question on D2L discussion board: you will be asked to post a question or an observation on the topic/chapter that we are addressing that week. Your question is due on Sundays at 11:59pm.
 - Project presentation “The future of Texas”: 10-minute group Powerpoint presentation, topic will be developed in class based on chapter 15 “Governing a changing Texas” of the textbook.

GRADING

Your grade will be comprised of:

- A) Three tests: 30%. Each test will make up 10% of your grade.
- B) Weekly chapter response: 20%

- E) Presentation “The future of Texas”: 10%
- F) Participation: 10%
 - Participation grade profiles: A (98) volunteers frequently and is always well-prepared
B (89) volunteers sometimes and is often prepared
C (79) does not usually volunteer but is moderately prepared
D (69) does not volunteer and is generally poorly prepared
F (0) is consistently unprepared.

Test policy

If you do not complete an exam during the designated class session, you will receive 0% for that exam.

If you have a legitimate reason for not completing an exam during the designated class session (e.g. severe illness or injury requiring professional medical care, emergencies in your immediate family, participation in official university activities, legal obligations) and you have supporting documentation for your inability to take the exam, then you may request taking a make-up exam that will take place during the week after the exam. Requests for make-up exams must be made either in advance of the exam date (for example, if missing class to participate in a university activity) or within 72 hours of missing an exam if the absence was caused by a legitimate unexpected reason.

Requests for taking the make-up exam must be submitted in writing via email and include scanned documentation explaining and substantiating why your inability to take the exam during the designated class session was legitimate. An approval to allow you to take a make-up exam will be based solely upon the instructor’s evaluation of your request and any supporting documentation.
