COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is the study of criminal law including application of definitions, statutory elements, defenses and penalties using Texas statutes, the Model Penal Code, and case law. The course also analyzes the philosophical and historical development of criminal law and criminal culpability.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Identify the elements of crimes and defense under Texas statutes, Model Penal Code, and case law.

- 2. Classify offense and articulate penalties for various crimes.
- 3. Compare culpable mental states when assigning criminal responsibility.
- 4. Assess the impact of history and philosophy on current criminal laws.
- 5. Evaluate the application of criminal law to other areas of criminal justice such as law enforcement and corrections.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

ASSESSMENTS

Attendance

Attendance is an essential part of the learning process; thus, students are expected to attend class regularly. This ensures students stay engaged with the course material through the instructor's interactive lectures, benefit from in-class discussions and activities, and learn from guest speakers from the field.

While some absences are unavoidable, you are responsible for making up missed absences and notifying the professor. Students are allotted three (3) unexcused absences before seeing a reduction in their class attendance score. Missing more than 25% of the class will result in a failing grade or removal from the class.

Class participation is an essential part of the learning process. Students are expected to have completed all the required readings and to be prepared to contribute to class activities and discussions. The goal of class participation is to engage in critical thinking, practice communication, and develop collaborative skills, all essential elements for professional success. Thus, participation will be assed based on the frequency, relevance, and quality of the contributions to class discussions, group activities, and online platforms. **Mere attendance alone without active engagement will result in a poor grade.** The instructor reserves the right to implement class participation strategies if participation falls below expectations.

Altogether, class attendance and participation is worth 10% of the total grade.

Explain It Like a TikTok

For this creative assignment, students will choose a criminal law concept (e.g., *mens rea, homicide*, etc.) and explain it in 60-90 seconds, just like you would in a short-form video platform like TikTok or Instagram Reels. You are charged with breaking down the topic clearly, accurately, and engagingly for a general audience. You are encouraged to record a video, narrate over slides, or use animation tools—but your explanation must be your own and demonstrate a solid grasp of the concept. Do note, you do not need to post to social media—just submit it to the appropriate submission portal on D2L. This assignment is worth 10% of your total grade.

Exams

There will be two (2) exams over the course of the semester, a Midterm and a Final. These exams include a variety of objective questions, such as true/false and multiple choice, as well as written components, such as short-answer and/or full-length essay questions. Exams are graded based on completeness, accuracy, and coherency. Each exam is worth 15% of the total grade.

Mini Case Analysis

Students will complete two structured legal analyses of real criminal cases over the course of the semester. Each paper will follow a five-part format: case overview, legal issue, relevant law, analysis, and conclusion. Students may select the cases themselves but must consult with the instructor to ensure the case is appropriate for the assignment. Each paper should be 1-2 pages in length, and together the two analyses will comprise 10% of the total grade.

Pre/Post Reflection

This is a two-part reflective assignment that bookends the semester. Students will write an initial reflection at the start of the course articulating their personal understanding and expectations for the class. In other words, students will describe their current understanding of criminal law, initial impressions and thoughts about the course, and what they hope to learn. Then, students will revisit those reflections at the end of the semester to assess how their thinking has evolved. Each reflection should be approximately one (1) page in length and follow APA norms. Each reflection is worth 5% of your total grade.

Presentation

Students will work in small groups to create, research, and present on one of two topics by the end of the semester. As a class, you will vote on one of two formats for the final presentation assignment:

- 1. Elements of a Crime: A Breakdown Your group will select on specific crime (e.g., assault) and present a clear, engaging explanation of its legal elements and application to a real-world case. Importantly, groups cannot present on the same topic. Sign-up sheets will be provided on D2L.
- Mock Trial Lite Your group will act out a simplified mock trial using a fictional
 case, presenting both sides of the case and applying relevant law to argue guilt
 or innocence.

Whichever format is chosen by class vote, all groups will be assessed on clarity, accuracy, teamwork, and presentation quality. Slides, visuals, or creative components are encouraged. This assignment is worth 10% of your final grade.

Weekly Legal Concept Comparison Log

Each week, students will complete a brief journal entry comparing three key legal terms or concepts covered in class. For each term, students will 1) define the term in their own words, 2) explain how it is defined or applied under both the Model Penal Code (MPC) and Texas Penal Code, and 3) analyze key differences or similarities, reflecting on how and why state law may differ from the MPC. This assignment should be about 1 page in length and will be worth 10% of your total grade.

COURSE AND UNIVERSITY PROCEDURES/POLICIES

Course Specific Procedures/Policies

Attendance and Participation

Class attendance is a vital part of participation and key to your success in this course. You are expected to attend class regularly and come prepared to engage with the material and your peers.

Attendance will be recorded using a simple attendance roster at the beginning of each class. If you arrive after the roster has circulated, it is your responsibility to speak with me immediately after class to ensure you are marked present. Failure to do so will result in an unexcused absence.

Missing more than 25% of class meetings—including both unexcused absences and chronic lateness—may result in a failing grade or removal from the course in accordance with university policy.

Excused absences for classes will be given without penalty to the grade in the case of any of the following reasons: (1) Participation in a required/authorized University activity; (2) Verified illness; (3) Death in a student's immediate family; (4) Obligation of a student at a legal proceedings in fulfilling responsibility as a citizen; and (5) Others determined by individual faculty to be excused (e.g., elective University activities, etc.).

Chronic Lateness Policy

Chronic lateness disrupts the class and undermines your engagement with the material. Arriving late more than three (3) times will begin to impact your attendance grade. For every additional three instances of lateness, your attendance grade will be reduced by 5%. For example: 1-3 late arrivals: no penalty, 4-6 late arrivals: -5%, 7-9 late arrivals, -10%, 10+ late arrivals: -15% (and a required meeting with the instructor).

Citation Style

Students are required to use the citation style and format of the American Psychological Association (APA). Review the *Publication manual of the American Psychological Association* (7th ed.) or similar APA Citation Style online resource. It is acceptable to cite legal materials (cases, statutes, regulations, etc.) in accordance with the style specified in *The Bluebook: A Uniform System of Citation* (22nd ed.) in all papers.

Extra credit

No individualized extra credit work will be permitted in my class. Why? Extra credit is unfair to the students who do their work diligently all semester long. However, extra credit may be offered to the whole class for a variety of activities that go beyond what is anticipated in the syllabus.

Late or Missed Assignments

All assignments are due by 11:59 pm on the stated due date unless otherwise noted. Late assignments will be penalized a full letter grade (10%) for every calendar day the assignment is late. After 5 days, late work will not be accepted unless you have made prior arrangements with the instructor.

Each student has **one (1) "Oops" Token** they can use during the semester for a noquestions-asked, **one-week extension** on any assignment (except exams). Simply submit the assignment late within 7 calendar days of the original deadline and comment "Using my Oops Token." No penalty will be applied, and no explanation is required.
