## Course Information

### Course Description

Early romantic elements in music. The development of the art song, piano music, opera, and instrumental music during the Nineteenth Century.

### Student Learning Outcomes

In this course, students will:

- Become familiar with practices and issues related to music during the nineteenth century period through exploration of topics such as institutions, music societies, patronage, and education
- Become acquainted with scholarly approaches and demonstrate an ability to conduct academic research by completing a final research paper

### Required Textbook

Frisch, Walter. *Music in the Nineteenth Century*. New York: W.W. Norton, 2013.

## Course Requirements

### Instructional Methods

Students will follow outlined activities for each week that include readings, in-person discussions, and assignments.

### Assessments

Participation: This course is based on in-person discussion and not lectures. Students are expected to come to class prepared to discuss assigned readings and pieces.

Reading Responses: Students will post brief reactions to assigned readings in D2L before class.

Style Analysis: Students will read a short story by ETA Hoffman and write an essay analyzing elements of Romanticism in it.

Opera Analysis: Students will give an analysis of a nineteenth-century opera.

Annotated Bibliography: Students will create a bibliography for their proposed final paper topic and provide annotations.

Abstract: After initial research, students will submit an abstract summarizing their final paper.

Presentation: Students will give a presentation outlining the major findings of their final paper.

Final Paper: The final paper will cover a research topic of the students' choosing within nineteenth-century music and will be at least 2,400 words. Students who submit a paper below the required word count will automatically receive a zero on the assignment.
