Course description:

The course has been designed for second-language learners (that is, students whose first language is not Spanish). The Spanish Program has adapted the 'CAN-DO' performance standards based on the MCER and ACTFL frameworks; considering these standards, students will start developing competence in the four communication skills, and they are expected to reach the Low-Intermediate to Intermediate-Mid levels by the end of the course (ACTFL 2012). The syllabus/schedule is subject to change. will also gain knowledge of various cultural aspects of the Spanish-speaking world by exploring cultural products and practices from Hispanic communities in the US and abroad. Students will make comparisons across languages and cultures and will recognize the ways in which Spanish extends beyond the classroom into the global community.

Student learning outcomes:

Students who successfully complete the course will:

1. Communicate in spoken and written Spanish on general topics, using words, phrases, and simple expressions with some level of creativity. The level target expected at the end of the course is Intermediate Low-to-Mid (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).
2. Understand general spoken and written Spanish discourse related to the topics learned in class. The level target expected at the end of the course is Intermediate Low-to-Mid (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).
3. Effectively select and integrate communication strategies to describe and explain information on general topics and cultural content.
4. Describe and compare products, practices, and perspectives related to work, housing, and the environment in diverse Spanish-speaking communities around the world.

Minimal technical skills:

Students in this course are expected to be able to:

- a) Manage TAMUC Library resources for advanced academic research,
- b) Competently use MSFT Office tools (Word, Excel, PowerPoint, etc.).
- c) Access, navigate, and use the diverse tools included in the course MyLeoOnline (D2L).

Student Responsibilities:

Students' participation is essential and required to succeed in this course. Students are expected to:

- 1) Actively engage in all classroom activities.
- 2) Read and prepare assigned materials by the due dates.
- 3) Complete and submit assignments by the due date.
- 4) Interact with each other and the instructor on a regular basis.

Activities and assignments:

1. Quizzes: There will be at least 3 quizzes based on each unit's content, focusing on vocabulary, language structures, and language strategies. Each test represents 30% of the final grade. For relevant dates, please see "Tentative Course Schedule".

2. Mid-semester interview: An individual oral interview will be conducted mid-semester to measure students' oral skills development. The interview will consist of a number of questions related to the topics discussed in class. Important note: Interviews will be conducted during the class and on a one to one basis. This activity represents 20% of the final grade.

3. Online activities: Students will complete diverse online exercises every week, including listening, reading, and writing activities. The activities are expected to be completed by the due date indicated in the "Tentative Course Schedule", and they will be evaluated by level of completion and accuracy. In addition, you will participate in MyLeoOnline discussion boards,

completing creative activities to practice writing and oral skills. Online activities represent 30% of the final grade.

4. Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA): The Spanish Language Program has incorporated the Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA) framework as the primary model for assessing students' progress. Following CARLA (2019) description, IPA is a set of interrelated linguistic tasks which allows students to demonstrate their Spanish competence on the three modes of communication: Interpretive (reading/listening and completing a comprehension activity); Interpersonal (interacting with another student or the instructor); and Presentational (writing or orally presenting information to an audience). The three tasks are aligned within a single theme, reflecting the manner in which learners will naturally use the language in the real world beyond the classroom. Each IPA task will be evaluated by scoring rubrics that rate performance in terms of whether the task meets expectations, exceeds expectations, or does not meet expectations. The IPA represents 20% of the final grade.

1. Participation

Attendance and participation are fundamental to succeed in this course. You are expected to attend all class meetings.

2. Syllabus Change Policy

The syllabus is a guide. Circumstances and events, such as student progress, may make it necessary for the instructor to modify the syllabus during the semester. Any changes made to the syllabus will be announced in advance.

3. Extra-credit

The syllabus/schedule is subject to change. During the semester, you will be invited to participate in different activities and short projects (cultural activities, film screenings, virtual lectures, etc.). Up to 3 extra points will be granted after attending the event/s and completing the assigned activities.
