COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Introduces first-semester Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) students to the legal, ethical, and professional standards that govern nursing practice. Explores the historical evolution of nursing, the scope of practice as defined by the Texas Nursing Practice Act (NPA), and the American Nurses Association (ANA) Scope and Standards of Practice. Emphasizes the critical importance of effective communication in all aspects of professional nursing, including patient advocacy, interprofessional collaboration, and legal documentation. Elicits a strong understanding of professional responsibilities and the ethical decision-making process essential for safe, competent, and compassionate patient care.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Describe the historical development of nursing as a profession and its current role in the healthcare system.

2. Analyze the key components of professional standards of practice as defined by the Texas Nursing Practice Act (NPA) and the American Nurses Association Scope and Standards of Practice.

3. Identify the legal responsibilities and liabilities of the professional nurse, including concepts of negligence, malpractice, informed consent, and patient privacy. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6; AACN Essentials 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10)
4. Apply ethical principles (e.g., beneficence, non-maleficence, autonomy, justice, fidelity, veracity) to common dilemmas encountered in nursing practice. (PLO 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6; AACN Essentials 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10)
5. Demonstrate effective verbal and non-verbal communication techniques essential for therapeutic nurse-patient relationships, interprofessional collaboration, and conflict resolution. (PLO 2, 4, 6; AACN Essentials 2, 6, 8)
6. Formulate a personal philosophy of nursing that integrates legal, ethical, and professional standards. (PLO 2, 5; AACN Essentials 1, 10)

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

Students must have an adequate working knowledge of the learning management system, Leomail, Microsoft Office Suite, Exemplify, ProjectConcert, and ATI online products.

Instructional Methods

Teaching methods include lecture, seminar, discussion, small group work, independent study of texts and library resources, computer-assisted instruction, audio-visual aids, student presentations, and assignments. While the faculty will provide guidance and consultation, the student is responsible for identification of learning needs, self-direction, seeking consultation, and demonstration of course objectives.

Student Responsibilities/Tips for Success in the Course

- Logging into the course website and email regularly for faculty communication (especially the night before class/clinical)
- Updating semester calendar with communicated changes
- Regular study (recommend a minimum 2-3 hours study/course credit hour per week). For example: 3-credit course = 6 to 9 hours study time/week.
- Attendance at all class meetings, clinical, seminars and simulations
- Review and remediation of examinations.

Assessments

- **Quizzes/Exams**
 - The purpose of quizzes and exams is to assess the student's understanding of the content of the learning resources assigned for each class session in preparation for discussion and application of the content.
 - Quiz/Exam items will include legal, ethical, and professional concepts.
 - Quiz items are developed at various levels of Bloom's revised taxonomy requiring the quiz taker to remember and understand major concepts presented throughout the course.
 - Scores are based on individual student performance and are recorded as the percentage of points earned out of total possible points.
- **Ethical Decision-Making Presentation**
 - In this assignment, student groups will analyze ethical dilemmas and propose solutions based on ethical frameworks and legal principles.
 - presents ethical issues encountered by nurses in a specific patient population and applies an ethical decision-making model in a simulated patient case.
 - Student groups will develop a 20-minute presentation of common or potential ethical issues associated with the assigned patient population; pose an ethical dilemma for a simulated patient; describe the ethical decision-making model used by the group in the scenario and the rationales for the choice; and guide the class through each step of the model to reach a final decision.
 - The presentation will be submitted for grading via the LMS assignment link prior to presentation in class. The rubric for the evaluation of this presentation is in the Rubric area of the syllabus and the LMS.
- **SBAR Assignment**
 -
- **Communication Skills Simulation/Role-Play/Body Swaps**
 - The purpose of the communication assignments is for the student to demonstrate developing competence in communication skills in health care.
 - Students practice communicating with patients, de-escalating difficult situations, and collaborating with colleagues, which improves patient care and teamwork skills.
 - Scores will be assigned based on time spent in the exercises and feedback from the AI software showing a measurable improvement in communication skills.

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- **Reflective Journaling**

- The purpose of reflective journaling is to gain a deeper understanding of your experiences, thoughts, and emotions related to your choice of professions - professional nursing.
- Reflective journaling moves beyond simple event-logging by encouraging you to explore the "why" and "how" behind your actions and feelings.
- engage in thoughtful reflection on course topics to include in a personal philosophy of nursing statement.

- **Personal Nursing Philosophy Statement**

- Your final project is your personal nursing philosophy. The purpose of creating a personal philosophy of nursing statement is to identify your emerging attitudes, beliefs and values about the nursing profession. Defining a philosophy provides a deeper connection to those beliefs and values.
- A personal philosophy helps shape the professional self and provides direction for attaining skills needed for a successful, meaningful career.
- This assignment is intended to be the start of a life-long, professional review of attitudes, beliefs, and values regarding key components of nursing practice and patient care.
- Students will write a personal philosophy using the criteria from the philosophy rubric to discuss their beliefs, attitudes, and values regarding the four domains of the nursing metaparadigm (person, environment, health, nursing).
- Before submitting the completed philosophy statements, students will partner with an assigned peer to provide written feedback regarding how their statements meet the grading criteria. Peer feedback should be considered when revising the final statements for submission. (Peer partners will be assigned by lottery.)
- The assignment submission will include 3 separate documents:
 - final philosophy statement (Word Document Only)
 - written feedback from a peer reviewer (signed & dated) (PDF Document Only)
 - written feedback to a peer (signed & dated) (PDF Document Only)
- **The level of competency for this assignment is 75%. If a score of 75% is not met after the initial submission, the assignment must be revised and resubmitted until the benchmark is met.**
- The rubric for the evaluation of this paper is in the Rubric area of the syllabus and in the LMS assignment.

COURSE SPECIFIC PROCEDURES/POLICIES

Assignment Submissions:

The syllabus and schedule are subject to change.

All class and clinical assignments must be submitted on time. If an extension is needed, students must request the extension before the posted due date/time. An assignment extension request will be approved or denied at the discretion of the course coordinator.

Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue; on the third day, the grade will be assigned as 0%. Communication on these matters is the student's responsibility. Multiple instances of late clinical assignments will result in receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and, possibly, failure of clinical/course.

All documents submitted online are to be in .docx, .rtf, or .pdf format. No other formats will be accepted (JPEG, GIF, etc.). Assignments need to be submitted in a maximum of one document per assignment. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in a grade of "0" on the assignment.

3. Exam dates are listed in each course syllabus, and the student is expected to be present for exams. If that happens, the instructor will notify the student in writing. The student will then be
