Course Description

Spanish 2311 continues the introduction to the Spanish language begun in SPA1311 and SPA1312 focusing on the cultures of the Spanish-speaking world as well as on the four language skills in a task-based communicative framework. SPA231 completes the introduction to basic Spanish grammatical structures while expanding language skills and cultural knowledge from previous courses. The use of the past tenses and the subjunctive mood constitute the grammar core of this course. In the language classroom, students gain an understanding of the nature of communication and the complexity of culture. The cultural component of language is of equal value to the linguistic one in learning to communicate effectively; therefore, students will also be introduced to the diverse cultures of the Spanish-speaking world. As per guidelines recommended by ACTFL, classes will be conducted using the target language as exclusively as possible (90% plus) at all levels of instruction during instructional time.

General Information

During regular terms, this course meets three days a week (MWF) or two days a week (TR, or WF). That said, this is a hybrid (i.e., computer-enhanced course), which means that you do a substantial portion of work outside of class using *Connect* (an online course management system: connect.mcgraw-hill.com). The activities in *Connect* will help you prepare for the in-class activities, which require one-on-one interaction among you, your classmates, and your instructor. See the attendance policy as attendance at class meetings are mandatory with a strict absence policy. Excessive absences will also result in additional grade-scale penalties. Excessive non-completion of Connect activities will also result in additional grade-scale penalties. Learning a language by means of a computer-enhanced course will provide the following advantages:

Self-pacing. You can take the time you need to do the on-line activities for the course as long as you complete the assignments before the deadlines.

Preparedness. Learning a language successfully requires consistent work and effort, and we therefore encourage you to have daily contact with *Connect*. Daily language practice will help you retain more than if you try to learn through last-minute cramming. Use the *Connect* site daily—not only will you come to class better prepared, but you will also greatly improve your chances of success in learning a second language.

Immediate feedback. *Connect* grades your homework exercises instantly and gives you the results. You can use this personalized feedback to improve your study habits and find out which concepts you might need to review.

Easy access. You can access your *Connect* homework from any computer with Internet access through a reliable Internet browser such as Firefox, Safari, Chrome, or Explorer.

Class Format: The format of this class is based on the premise that the best way to learn a foreign language is through repeated, meaningful exposure to the language and through multiple opportunities for meaningful interaction with others—even at the very beginning levels. For this reason, class time will be dedicated to communicating in the second language using the structures and vocabulary *that you have practiced in Connect prior to class*. You, the student, have an active role in class, while the role of your course instructor is that of "communication facilitator." If you need extra help with grammar and/or vocabulary, do not hesitate to see your instructor during their office hours. However, please do not expect your instructor to repeat a class for you that you have missed, or to answer questions about material in *Connect* that you have never covered yourself online. Do this work first, and then see your instructor if you have follow-up questions or if you feel you still don't have a full understanding of the information covered in that lesson. *Connect* offers many opportunities for language practice.

Your instructor will use only the target language in class—this is a deliberate element of the course design and is intended to provide increased exposure to the language. You will probably not understand everything the instructor is saying right away—but do not worry! There are many non-verbal ways of communicating, and you will be surprised to see just how much you understand early on. Coming to class fully prepared, ready to participate and to contribute, will give you a tremendous learning advantage, and will also contribute greatly to the larger classroom learning environment. On this last note, please remember to be respectful of your peers, and refrain from any behavior in class that could detract from other students' learning experience (such as eating during class, sending text messages, leaving the room frequently, talking in English, interrupting, and so forth). Your instructor reserves the right to prohibit any such behaviors that detract from the learning environment.

Students' grades will be rounded off to the higher grade when the grade is .50% or above (e.g., 89.50% or higher = A-; 89.49% or lower = B+). Grade Calculation

The grades in this course are weighted, which means that some assignments for this course count more for your final grade than others. To put this another way: Do not try and determine your current course grade simply by dividing points earned by the total number of points possible

Participation

The success of a language course depends on the active preparation and participation of all participants. We are a learning community, and everyone else in the classroom depends on you to come prepared and ready to engage with the materials and with your peers.

Participation is an important component of your final grade. Each day your instructor will record a daily participation grade for you in their grade book. If you miss class, no participation points can be awarded for that day. Official university policy recognizes certain categories of absence as "excusable," upon the presentation of proper documentation to the course instructor. The following are the most frequently recognized categories of "excusable" absence (upon presenting sufficient documentation, as requested by the course instructor):

- Observance of religious holidays*
- Military service or other military obligations
- Jury duty and/or other court-related appearances
- Documented appointment requiring your in-person appearance at a government embassy, consulate, or other official government office/ location.
- Doctor's visits or true medical emergencies, including severe contagious illness (such as influenza) for which you are under a doctor's care and have proper medical documentation
- Prior approved and properly documented University-sponsored activities (athletic, academic, student government, or etc.) that demand your presence.

You will be able to check your weekly participation grades . If you do not receive a grade, ask your instructor for one. If you do not agree with the participation grade, or do not understand how it was determined, speak to your instructor *immediately*. All questions regarding a particular weekly participation grade must be settled within one week of the date in question.

Daily participation will be graded according to the following scale: 2 points each day for fall/spring semesters and 6 points each day for summer sessions. Points are distributed as follows:

2 points

- Arrived on time to the classroom, attended the full class and participated in all activities using the target language *and*
- Brought or accessed all required materials (including textbook) to the class *and*
- Completed all assigned Connect assignments prior to class time *and*
- Actively contributed to a positive classroom atmosphere conducive to learning

1 point

- Did not attend the entire class *and/or*
- Was unprepared (not having completed Connect the assignments for that day) *and/or*
- Did not bring/access to required materials *and/or*
- Did not participate fully, and/or was not paying attention, *and/or*
- Did not actively contribute to a positive atmosphere conducive to learning
- Arrived late to class but less than 10 minutes late or departed early (less than 10 minutes left). (30 minutes or less late or early departure of less than 30 minutes for summer)

0 points

- Was absent or arrived late more than 10 minutes to the class session or departed more than 10 minutes early. (30 minutes or more late or early departure of 30 minutes for summer)
- Did not participate in any activities
- Behaved inappropriately in class, or was a distraction to the entire class

At the end of the semester, all students will receive additional points added to their participation grade and these points will be reflected in the last week's column of the grade center. The purpose of these points is to make up for the occasional point lost during the semester for reasons other than the excusable absences above.

Attendance Policy

Students are expected to attend all of their scheduled University classes and to satisfy all academic objectives as outlined by the instructor. The effect of absences upon grades is determined by the instructor, and the University reserves the right to deal at any time with individual cases of non-attendance. See the following information regarding penalties for absences.

Students are responsible for arranging to make up work missed because of legitimate class absence, such as illness, religious holy days, family emergencies, military obligation, court-imposed legal obligations, or participation in university-approved activities. Examples of university-approved reasons for absences include participating in an athletic or scholastic team, musical and theatrical performances, and debate activities, among others. It is the student's responsibility to give the instructor notice prior to any anticipated absences and within a reasonable amount of time after an unanticipated absence, ordinarily by the next scheduled class meeting. Instructors must allow each student who is absent for a university-approved reason the opportunity to make up work missed without any reduction in the student's final course grade as a direct result of such absence.

Students will NOT be exempt from this policy, except in cases that are in line with university regulations regarding attendance policy.

- A. Class Absences:** A good class environment depends on the participation and commitment of ALL students—and all of us in this learning community depend on each other’s active participation to gain meaningful language practice. Active class attendance, moreover, can boost your grade.

GRADE PENALTIES FOR EXCESSIVE ABSENCES: For instance, a student whose final grade (before absences) is an “A” but who has three absences for a 2-day per week course will receive one grade-scale reduction (from A to A-), and will therefore receive an A- as the final course grade. A student whose final grade (before absences) is a “B” but who has five absences for a 2-day per week course will receive three grade-scale reductions (first from B to B-, then from B- to C+, then from a C+ to a C), and will therefore receive a C as the final course grade. Also, see the section of the syllabus regarding Connect non-completions for information on how excessive Connect non-completions can also result in grade penalties. In order to not penalize students for both absences and participation, for each grade reduction, you will get back two participation points. For example, if at the end of the semester you have three grade reductions, you will receive 6 participation points back. From there, your grade reductions will apply.

- B. Late Arrivals/Early Departures:** We have a lot of ground to cover during each class meeting, and it is essential that you arrive in class on time (in addition to coming to class prepared) and remain for the entirety of the class session. Arriving late (or leaving early) makes it much more difficult for you to understand and retain the course material. Moreover, a late arrival (or early departure) disrupts the entire class (even those who did arrive on time, or well ahead of time). Because of this, late arrivals or early departures of 10 or more minutes will be recorded by the instructor, and documented as if it were an absence.

Please note that your instructor reserves the right to:

- a. deny entrance to any student arriving to class 10 minutes late or more (30 minutes for summer), and
- b. dismiss anyone from a given class whom the instructor deems as disruptive, and/ or count them as being absent for the day.

Prerequisite: SPA 1311 or approved placement of CLEP or consent of department head.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete the course:

1. can communicate in spoken and written Spanish on topics of personal and general interest, in a variety of discourse formats. Level target is Intermediate-Low (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).
2. can understand spoken and written Spanish discourse related to general daily life topics. Level target is Intermediate-Mid (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).
3. can present information on topics of personal and general interest, and cultural content, using practiced phrases and simple expressions. Level target is Intermediate-Mid (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).

4. can select and use some communicative strategies, including: increased awareness of error; self-correction; edit own production; simplify complex expressions.
5. can demonstrate cultural awareness by describing and analyzing products and practices from diverse Spanish-speaking communities around the world, gaining insights on different cultural

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness

In order to measure the level of compliance with the university's Institutional Effectiveness guidelines, I will collect some of the ungraded materials you will produce for the class. Students are expected to: 1) actively engage in all classroom activities, including the in-person class meetings, 2) read and prepare assigned materials by the due dates, 3) complete and submit assignments by the due date, and 4) interact with each other and the instructor regularly.

a. Course communication. Good communication in an online setting is a fundamental component of success. Please consider the different types of media available for communication with your instructor and classmates, in individual and group formats. Please follow [Netiquette rules](#) to keep our conversation professional, engaging and polite.

During the semester, we will use three main means of communication:

- *Announcements:* General tool for course communication; I will post short messages or reminders related to due dates or changes in the assignments.
- *Email:* Please only use the official East Texas A&M Leo Email to communicate with me and your classmates. I will send general emails with information related to the course, date changes, assignments modifications, etc. or with information that relate to our content. I will send individual emails as needed. I will respond to emails in 24 hs. during the work week and by the next business day on weekends and holidays.

- *General Discussion Board*: Located in the “General Resources” folder, this board is open to all participants; anyone can post a comment, question or suggestion related or unrelated to the course. All students are encouraged to participate and post responses; I will visit this board regularly.

Students are required to complete each full IPA cycle (all portions) in order to be assessed; incomplete cycles cannot be evaluated, therefore if the student misses any of the tasks, the resulting grade will be 0 (zero).

Each IPA cycle will be evaluated with scoring rubrics that rate performance in terms of whether the task meets expectations, exceeds expectations, or does not meet expectations. More information will be presented later in the semester as well as on the “IPA” module on the course page.

6. Extra-credit

The Spanish Program at East Texas A&M presents a variety of events each semester and invites you to actively participate. 3 extra-points will be granted after attending the event/s and completing the assigned activities.

COURSE AND UNIVERSITY PROCEDURES/POLICIES

Course Specific Procedures

1. Participation

Attendance and participation in the face-to-face / virtual sessions are fundamental to succeed in this course. You are expected to attend all class meetings. For more information, please see “East Texas A&M Attendance” in “University Procedures Policies” in the next section of the syllabus.
