**REQUIRED MATERIALS**

**Textbook(s) Required:** For this course, we will be using a platform called Top Hat that is included through East Texas A&M University's Inclusive Access fee. Top Hat will be accessible through our course shell in D2L. **Additional textbook purchases will not be necessary.**

To gain access to Top Hat, you will create an account using your university email (LeoMail). Be on the lookout for this email at the beginning of the semester - it should come from the ETAMU bookstore.

of our D2L course shell. Upon being re-directed to Top Hat, you can create an account if you are a new user or log in if you have an existing account. ## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

ENG 100 is a non-credit course that provides an introduction to the elements of literacy necessary for college-level reading and writing. In this course, students will complete a combination of low-stake and high-stake assignments, both of which the instructor will provide individualized feedback on. This course serves as a support course for ENG 1301 and is required for those who are not Texas Success Initiative (TSI) complete in either reading and/or writing. This course is also available to anyone who may desire additional support for ENG 1301.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES & LEARNING OUTCOMES**

In ENG 100, students can expect to:

- Practice critical thinking, reading, and writing skills
- Build a rhetorical vocabulary and individualized writing process
- Develop original responses based on a variety of texts

- Use evidence to support claims - primarily quoting, paraphrasing, and summarizing - while avoiding plagiarism
- Effectively organize ideas in paragraphs and essays
- Demonstrate revision and reflection

These objectives and learning outcomes are designed to align with ENG 1301.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

ETAMU Writing Program instructors share their position on and preferences for AI, GenAI, and AGI integration with students, and students follow the instructor's guidelines and the requirements of the course. Undocumented uses of AI, GenAI, and AGI can constitute an instance of academic dishonesty, including cases related to issues like plagiarism and misrepresentation in student deliverables.
