Course Description

This course is a graduate-level course designed to get students acquainted with the techniques, procedures, methods, and approaches to undertaking scholarly work in the field of applied

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linguistics. We focus particularly on the social practices that scientists engage in in this field, by following the steps needed to complete a research paper, including finding a research topic, framing research questions, assessing literature, conducting research synthesis, and writing a literature review

Learning Outcomes

Upon completion of this course, students will

1. Be able to locate and develop a research topic of their interest;
2. Be able to find relevant research and appraise its quality;
3. Develop the understanding of different research methods and research skills;
4. Develop a good command of the APA style;
5. Enhance academic writing skills and be able to produce a high-quality literature review paper.

Course Ground Rules

In this course, all work will be completed through D2L. You should check the course website frequently for assignments, announcements, and discussions. I strongly recommend dedicating set days/times to completing your work and working in advance. You are expected to put 2-3 hours a day to work on the course materials. Please also note that **assignment due dates are crucial. No delayed assignments will be accepted.** Moreover, we are co-constructing our knowledge in the learning community. Please be prepared, share thoughtfully, respond respectfully, and engage in all learning processes.

I also expect that students will exhibit courtesy toward others. Courtesy means NOT engaging in online rudeness or refusing to focus on group work or class discussion. Courtesy means engaging in behaviors such as listening carefully to others, accepting that various points of views can be valid, maintaining a focus on the discussion in hand and treating others as you wish to be treated.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

The following assignments help students achieve the learning outcomes. Detailed information and guidelines for each assignment will be posted to the course website.

- **Online Discussions** (4 x 5 points) --- Online discussions provide students with opportunities to demonstrate their learning and ability to apply the course knowledge and scaffold each other's learning in the online community. There are two deadlines each week: one for posting your initial response to discussion prompts (i.e., by **Thursday** midnight), and one for responding to at least three of your classmates (i.e., **Sunday** midnight). Students will complete 4 online discussion assignments.
- **Exercises** (4 x 5 points) --- Students complete 4 exercises in relation to academic writing and documentation style. Close reading of the required texts is important.
- **Annotated Bibliography** (15 points)—After students determine their specific research topic within applied linguistics, they complete an annotated bibliography in which they summarize and evaluate eight scholarly sources (e.g., journal articles and

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book chapters) about the selected topic. Research topic needs to be approved by the instructor.

- **Outline for Final Paper** (15 points) and **Final Paper** (30 points) --- Based on the literature search and annotated bibliography, students write a high-quality literature review paper. Before completing the final paper, students work on a detailed outline for the final paper.

Total Possible = 100 points (“No curve” grading scale / 100 percent possible, 90-100=A 80-89=B 70-79=C, and so on.

Assignment Submission

- Our work week runs from Monday to Sunday. All assignments must be submitted by the designated due date (mostly Sunday 11:59pm). No late work will be accepted. In a special circumstance with a valid excuse (which needs to be documented in paper and authorized), you may be granted with 24-hour grace period to complete your assignments.
- The submission should be in an appropriate academic format (i.e., APA). Failure to conform to the standards will result in points deducted. Please refresh your knowledge of the APA style via https://owl.purdue.edu/owl/research_and_citation/apa_style/apa_formatting_and_style_guide/general_format.html

- Do not trust AI to supply citation information. Do your own research and include the proper citation information in your writing.
- You are not allowed to use AI to generate an entire assignment.
- You are permitted to use AI to facilitate your completion of the course assignments if you acknowledge your use of it and document how you use it. Please include a statement at the end of any assignment that uses AI explaining what you used the AI for and the link of your chat history. Failure to do so is in violation of academic honesty policies.
- When in doubt about whether your use of AI in a course assignment is appropriate, check with me before submitting your work for a grade.
