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Course Description and Assessment Outcome

This course is designed as a continuation, development and expansion of MUS 313 with an emphasis on instrumental conducting. It is designed to develop a professional conducting approach with emphasis on techniques appropriate to instrumental conducting. Upon successful completion of the course and the conducting sequence (MUS 313 & 414) the student will be able to:

1) Demonstrate a mastery of beginning and intermediate conducting techniques with an enabling posture, a proper grip of the baton, and clear indications of preparatory gestures, downbeats, patterns for symmetrical and asymmetrical meters, dynamics, cues, beat subdivisions, syncopation, and alterations of tempo (i.e. tempo rubato); 2) Demonstrate expressive intentions through both physical conducting and oral communication; 3) Demonstrate effective score analysis and score preparation; 4) Demonstrate an understanding of performance practice according to the various stylistic periods of composition; 5) Demonstrate visual/aural discrimination skills for error detection; 6) Demonstrate the necessary skills to analyze, diagnose, and prescribe solutions to musical problems in a rehearsal setting; 7) Exhibit a knowledge of transpositions and their use in score reading (Instrumental); 8) Demonstrate Solfeggio competency both in prepared and sight-reading applications (Vocal); 9) Critically evaluate technical and musical criteria of an ensemble rehearsal/performance.

Since the art of conducting demands a spontaneous physical and mental response from the conductor, the ultimate objective of instrumental conducting will be the development of each student's ability to critically evaluate technical and musical criteria of the ensemble rehearsal/performance and to clearly demonstrate musical intentions through physical and oral communication.

Course syllabus & class timelines are subject to change at instructor's discretion.

Because the development of conducting skills and rehearsal techniques are, in fact, directly related to: (1) the innate and learned musical skills of the individual student, (2) the ability to apply listening skills in an analytical manner, (3) the student's pedagogical knowledge of all instruments (winds, strings, percussion), (4) the ability to associate music history and style to performance practices, (5) the personality and confidence of each student to communicate these skills to the performers in the ensemble, each undergraduate conducting student will ultimately be faced with the challenge of developing individual weaknesses, the same as in the study of his/her applied instrument. It is assumed that all students have achieved competence in solfeggio, melodic/harmonic dictation, and a conversant knowledge of the performance fundamentals and practices of all instruments as taught in instrumental techniques and music education classes. Should any of these areas be deficient, the student will be expected to initiate individual practice and/or assistance to improve these essential skills.

Prerequisites:

Open to music majors only. Prerequisites: Successful completion of 1st semester instrumental conducting MUS 313 (C or above) and successful completion of the theory and ear-training pre-requisites as prescribed by the Department of Music for the student's degree plan.

Modality:

This course will be provided in a face-to-face format. In addition, there will be video tutorials available through D2L and most assignments will be submitted through Go-react and/or D2L.

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COURSE ENGAGEMENT:

Engagement in the course is the student's responsibility. Students are expected to fully participate in the courses whether face-to-face or in a virtual modality. It is also imperative that students and faculty communicate consistently and frequently. If, for any reason, you, the student, are not able to complete assignments or actively engage in the course, you **MUST** contact your instructor. Engagement and Participation in the course will be assessed per the individual instructor.

Attendance Policy

Since each member of the class relies on the other students to form the ensemble they conduct, all students are expected to be present at each class meeting and to participate fully in each class unless the absence falls under the excused absence policy.

Communication with the instructor of any absences is of the utmost importance. Excused absences are defined as illness, family emergency, or a University related event or activity (with prior approval). Courtesy dictates calling in advance of an absence whenever possible. Potential absences, other than those listed above, should be discussed directly with the conductor at the beginning of the semester or as early as possible. Final classification of absences will at the sole discretion of the instructor. **3 tardies equal one unexcused absence.**

Unexcused absences in excess of TWO (2) will result in a lowering of the final earned grade at the rate of ONE (1) letter grade for each TWO (2) absences.

Example: 1-2 absences = No Effect
 3-4 absences = Grade lowered by 1 letter grade
 5-6 absences = Grade lowered by 2 letter grades
 7+ absences = Grade of D if withdrawal requested (or) final grade of F

Grading:

Grades will be determined as follows:

A = 90%-100%
B = 80%-89%
C = 70%-79%
D = 60%-69%
F = 59% or Below

Grades will be determined on the basis of:

Daily Preparation	10 %
Written Assignments	5 %

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Conducting Practicums 1-5	55 %
Conducting Practicum 6 (Final)	15 %
Average	100%

Please Note: Assignments will be accepted late only in the event of an excused absence with clear and timely communication! Appropriate documentation verifying the excused absence should accompany the assignment. Assignments are due at the beginning of the class period. *Note: If the situation warrants a shift to fully based virtual learning at any point, additional assignments may be added and grading percentages adjusted accordingly.
