Course Description

This course is designed to help students better understand the social world in which they live as well as provide a foundation for other courses in sociology. It provides an overview of major concepts and principles of sociology, including socialization, deviance, stratification, gender, and race. This course emphasizes global dynamics from a sociological perspective and helps students view themselves as engaged citizens within an interconnected and diverse world.

- **In-Class Writings-** Each week there will be at least one short writing assignment related to the course material (often based on an in-class activity). You must be in attendance to complete that session's in-class writing and they cannot be made up. Students who arrive in class after the in-class writing has begun may not receive credit for that day's writing. Three will be dropped, giving you some wiggle room in case of absences. Each will be graded on a check-plus (100%), check (85%), check-minus (75%) scale. Worth 10 points each.
