### ***Course Description:***

Description from the Graduate Course Catalog: "This course will cover topics in gerontology including physical and mental changes in older adults, transitions such as retirement, mental health issues for the older adult, and health issues. The course will provide needed information to help the older adult adjust to changes in life. The course will focus on positive sides of aging which are often neglected."

### ***Student Learning Outcomes:***

The student will demonstrate an understanding of:

- the importance of the psychology of aging
- mental health and aging
- cultural differences in aging
- current mental health concerns in aging

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

### **Minimal Technical Skills Needed:**

Students are to use word processing programs to complete the course successfully.

### **Instructional Methods:**

A variety of teaching strategies will be used in this class, including lecture, discussion, and review of media in various formats. For students to benefit from these teaching strategies, it is critical that they keep pace with readings assigned in class. Additionally, students will take part in role-plays demonstrating the application of cognitive-behavioral interventions. Students will note that some of the material presented in class will be consistent with their readings in their text. Other information will not be found in the text but provided from resources used by the instructor.

### **Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course:**

To be successful in this course, log into the course on D2L regularly and follow the course modules. Other recommendations to help be successful in this course include: (a) getting the contact information of one of your classmates (in the event you missed a class or just need clarification), (b) contacting a librarian at TAMUC (you can do this over the phone), and (c) e-mailing Dr. Smart with any questions.

### **Assignment 1: Short Papers (There are five individual short papers.) 50% of total grade, 10% each)**

During the assigned weeks, each student will be responsible for writing a short paper on a topic of their choice related to the material covered that week. The Short Paper must be written following the Short Paper Rubric, with guidelines posted in the Announcements.

**Due Weeks 2, 4, 6, 8, 12 per the course schedule.**

### **Assignment 2: Term Research and Application Paper (3 parts, (a) topic statement, (b) annotated bibliography, and (c) final paper for a total of 50% of the term grade).**

Each student will select a topic to explore and research for the final paper, which is due at the end of the course. The student must submit a (a) well-defined topic statement in Week 3 (5% of the student's grade), an (b) annotated bibliography in Week 10 (10% of the student's grade), and (c) the final research and application paper is due in the final week in APA 7.0 format (35% of the student's grade).

The paper must be written as a comprehensive research paper using the APA template supplied by Dr. Smart or another APA 7.0 template, citing the literature (peer-reviewed journal articles), exploring the topic, interleaving source topics, and integrating an application as to how a clinician would use the research in clinical practice. The paper needs to have the following sections:

- Abstract with keywords.
- Introduction
- Purpose and Problem
- Theoretical Framework
- Exploration of the Research
- Clinical Application
- Conclusion
- References

There can be sub-sections within each major section. The paper should be between 20 and 30 pages. **Final Submission is Due April 30<sup>th</sup>, 11:59 PM**

### **Topic Statement (5%)**

The topic statement should be a concise paragraph stating the specific research topic and its relevance for clinical practice. **Due Week 3: February 1 at 11:59 PM**

### **Annotated Bibliography (10%)**

The annotated bibliography needs to include at least 10 peer-reviewed journal articles, and you can use other credible academic sources, such as books, etc. The annotated bibliography should be written in APA format, with the citation followed by a paragraph or two that summarizes the relevance of the source to the selected topic. **Due Week 10: March 22 at 11:59 PM**

### **Course Specific Procedures/Policies**

1. Professionalism: It is expected that you demonstrate professionalism. For the purposes of this course, professionalism will be exhibited by the student: (a) completing all assigned readings, (b) submitting assignments by the deadline, and (c) adhering to the university student code of conduct (e.g., plagiarism, cheating).

2. Writing Assignments: Prepare all written assignments according to the APA Publications Manual (7th ed.), as appropriate. You can access information regarding basic APA style at <http://owl.english.purdue.edu> or the Learning Center located on the main floor of the library.

- a. All submissions will be reviewed by Turnitin to check for plagiarism. Turnitin will provide a score indicating the percentage of the paper it determines to be paraphrased incorrectly. Dr. Smart will review all submissions with a score of 30% or higher, specifically verifying the sources. If the source does not support the claim, the professor will return the paper to the student for revisions. If, upon return submission, the paper remains not cited correctly, the professor will assign a final grade to the paper according to the rubric.
- b. The best way to avoid potential confusion is to become proficient in paraphrasing or stating things in multiple ways that differ from the original source(s).

c. East Texas A&M University strongly encourages all students to take advantage of student resources. Bonus points are awarded to students who utilize the Writing Center staff to enhance their writing skills.
