Course Description

The course will provide a survey of populations with exceptionalities. Attention will be given to the cause of these deviations and their effect upon the individual's development. Professional roles of the special education team member as well as the policies and regulations applicable to special education programs in general will be covered.

Assessments

Exams:

Three objective exams will be given on the scheduled dates. Tests will be taken in D2L (my Leo), and will be randomized to each user. You will have one attempt at each test. You will have unlimited time to take the exam. **There will be NO MAKEUP opportunities for missed tests.** However, if there is a technical issue, those will be handled on a case-by-case basis.

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IEP Scavenger Hunt:

In this assignment, students will use a sample Individualized Education Plan to locate answers to specific questions.

Special Education: Students at a Glance:

In this assignment, students will read an article on organizing information related to student accommodations in special education and reflect upon how this method could be beneficial.

Multicultural Assignment:

In this assignment, students will reflect upon the social model of disability and the medical model of disability, as well as asset-based and deficit-based approaches to education.

Film/Book Analysis

This assignment will allow students to analyze how society experiences “disability” as it is portrayed in media.
