Course Description

Elementary Spanish II is the second introductory class in the four-course sequence of the Spanish Language Program at TAMUC. The course has been designed for second-language learners (this is, students whose first language is not Spanish). The Spanish Program has adapted the 'CAN-DO' percontinue start developing competence in the four communication skills, and they are expected to reach the [Intermediate-low level](#) by the end of the course (ACTFL 2012). They will also gain knowledge of various cultural aspects of the Spanish-speaking world by exploring cultural products and practices from Hispanic communities in the US and abroad. The Spanish Program has adopted Open Educational Resources (OER) as main resources, aligning with principles of [Open Education](#). We invite our students to participate in this educational movement that promotes openness, trust, creativity and generosity.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students who successfully complete the course will:

1. Communicate in spoken and written Spanish on general and everyday topics, using practiced words, phrases and simple expressions. Level target expected at the end of the course is High Novice (ACTFL Proficiency Guidelines).
2. Understand simple spoken and written Spanish discourse related to food & meals, celebrations, clothing, and travel. Level target expected at the end of the course is Intermediate Low (AFTL Proficiency Guidelines).
3. Present and explain basic information on cultural content, using different communicative strategies.
4. Identify and describe products and practices related to daily life, from diverse Spanish-speaking communities around the world.

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness

In order to measure the level of compliance with the university's Institutional Effectiveness guidelines, I will collect some of the ungraded materials you will produce for the class. Activities & assessments

1. CHAPTER EXAMS (32% final grade)

There will be four exams based on units' contents, focusing on vocabulary, language structures, language strategies and cultural content. Each test represents 8% of the final grade. For relevant dates please see “Tentative Course Schedule”.

2. WEEKLY HOMEWORK (28% final grade):

Students will complete diverse exercises every week based on the content unit. Some of the activities will be audio recordings and videos, so please make sure you have access to a computer with good video and sound capabilities. The activities are expected to be completed by the due date and they will be evaluated by level of completion and accuracy. Weekly activities represent 28% of the final grade.

3. COMMUNICATION TASKS (10% of final grade):

There will be 4 communication tasks. These will mimic the three linguistical tasks evaluated in the Final IPA: Presentational (Individual speaking or writing), Interpersonal (in a group or with a partner) and Interpretive (Reading or Listening.) The activities are expected to be completed by the due date and they will be evaluated by level of completion and accuracy. Communication Tasks represent 10% of the final grade.

4. PARTICIPATION (15% of final grade):

For each class meeting, students will engage in a number of communication tasks. Attendance and full participation in class is required for full credit. Participation represents 15% of the final grade.

5. Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA) (15% of final grade)

This Spanish course has incorporated the Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA) framework as primary model for assessing students' progress. An Integrated Performance Assessment (IPA) will be given at the end of the semester in order to assess learner fluency. It will consist of two parts: Interpretive and Presentational. Following the CARLA (2019) description, IPA is "a set of interrelated linguistic tasks which allows students to demonstrate their Spanish competence on the three modes of communication: *Interpretive* (reading/listening and completing a comprehension activity); *Interpersonal* (interacting with another student or the instructor); and *Presentational* (writing or orally presenting information to an audience). The three tasks are aligned within a single theme, reflecting the manner in which learners will naturally use the language in the real world beyond the classroom."

Students are required to complete each full IPA cycle (all portions) in order to be assessed; incomplete cycles cannot be evaluated, therefore if the student misses any of the tasks, the resulting grade will be 0 (zero).

Each IPA cycle will be evaluated with scoring rubrics that rate performance in terms of whether the task meets expectations, exceeds expectations, or does not meet expectations. More information will be presented later in the semester as well as on the "IPA" module on the course page.

6. Extra-credit

The Spanish Program at TAMUC presents a variety of events each Spring and invites you to actively participate. 3 extra-points will be granted after attending the event/s and completing the assigned activities.

Course Specific Procedures

1. Participation
