### **COURSE INFORMATION**

#### **Course Description**

Understanding Human Development is a developmental psychology course that examines the changes, both growth and decline, across the human lifespan from conception to death. It includes physical, cognitive, and socioemotional changes that help to shape our lives. Topics include the importance of the prenatal environment on development, formation of language, self-esteem, identity, romantic relationships, retirement, and dying. What you will find is that our journey through life is incredible – from learning to walk to compensating for physical declines in later life.

#### **Student Learning Outcomes**

1. Students will recognize key issues regarding physical, cognitive, and socioemotional changes that occur across the major stages of

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development – prenatal, infancy, early childhood, mid-late childhood, adolescence, early adulthood, middle adulthood, and late adulthood, and death and dying

2. Students will demonstrate the importance of research along with understanding how this research is conducted, including research methodology and ethical issues
3. Students will further develop communication skills to discuss psychological concepts related to developmental psychology

### **COURSE REQUIREMENTS/ASSESSMENTS**

1. **Two Content Exams** – Testing promotes learning (Roediger & Karpicke, 2006). There will be two exams in the course. The instructor will provide study guides to prepare for the exams. Exams are worth 40% of your course grade (20% each).
2. **Participation** – In-class participation is expected. This can be in the form of paying attention, asking questions, and discussing course content. This is worth 10% of your course grade.
3. **Self-Reflection** – Students will write a paper that applies the content of this course to their life. Students will be required to discuss themes relevant to their life and link it with textual evidence. Students should work on this paper over the course of the semester. During the final class period we will meet and students will share one theme with the class. See D2L for instructions. The self-reflection assignment is worth 30%.
4. **Debate** – Students will be assigned to a group to present a debate. For each debate there will be two groups – one for and one against. Each side will present their case. See D2L for more information. The debate is worth 20% of your grade.
5. **Research Exposure Requirement** – A goal of this class is to help you become familiar with psychological research. One way to obtain this goal is to have you participate in research studies. Participating in research studies contributes to students and faculty at East Texas A&M, your understanding of how research is conducted, and human

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knowledge in general. All students in this class will be required to participate in the psychology department's participant pool or complete alternative assignments (see me for more information on D2L for the alternative writing assignment).

Students must complete a total of 6 experiment credits. However, if you complete your first 4 experiment credits without any "no-shows" you will receive 2 free *punctual participant credits*. In other words, if you show up to your experiments on time you will only need to complete 4 experiment credits. When you first sign into the experiment management system (EMS) you will be asked to take a prescreen. The prescreen takes about 20 minutes to complete. If you complete the prescreen in the first two weeks of the semester you will receive ½ free experiment credit. This can be combined with later experiments that are worth ½ credit.

If you fail to complete this portion of the class your grade will be lowered by one full grade. In effect, if you have an 'A' in the class but fail to complete your research participation (either through participating in research studies, alternative assignments, or a mixture of both) your final grade in the class will be a 'B.' More information about participating in research, such as how to log in to the EMS, is located in D2L.

**\*\* Students may complete up to three additional research exposure credits for extra credit.**
