### **Course Description**

Explore connections between Romantic authors –itinerant observers of the natural and social world—and the concept of the monster as an outsider who reflects and reveals social fears and hidden truths. Through traveling metaphorically and literally to the sights of *Frankenstein's* birth, class members will investigate, as Shelley and her circle did, enduring questions around what it means to be human, the nature of community connection, and the role of art and they artist in a technology-infused society experiencing rapid, volatile change.

As a signature honors experience, a 12-week in-person course with an online option prepares students intellectually and methodologically for the **embedded study abroad program, which will take place May 13–27**. The course integrates group and individual projects that emphasize real-world learning, critical inquiry, and future visioning.

The Study abroad program will blend a City as Text curriculum with content-relevant visits to sites central to understanding Mary Shelley's life, the composition of her first and most famous novel, *Frankenstein*, and the context of authorship and monsters during times of social and economic revolution.

### **Course Student Learning Outcomes**

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

1. Analyze literary and cultural texts through lenses of monstrosity, Romanticism, and modernity.
2. Practice ethical, intentional observation in a variety of contexts.
3. Collaborate with others to produce analytical, digital, and/or creative work.
4. Synthesize classroom learning with experiential travel in Europe to produce a scholarly or creative inquiry project integrating course concepts and travel reflections.

### **Honors College Capstone Requirement: Fall 2026 Symposium**

HC 497 is designed to fulfill the requirements of an Honors Capstone as a study abroad experience. All capstone experiences require a public demonstration of knowledge, which can be fulfilled in a variety of ways. Students are especially encouraged to present their travel journals and reflective projects at the Fall 2026 Honors Symposium.

5–7 minute presentation synthesizing course learning + personal goals.

**6. Travel Journal (May 13–27) (60 pts)**

Daily author/monster entries + prompts.

**7. Final Synthesis Project (100 pts)**

Research, creative, or multimedia project combining course + travel learning.
