### Course Description

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This online graduate course explores advanced sociological principles through the use of selected classic and contemporary readings. Students will be expected to read, synthesize, and integrate a wide variety of sociological materials and to analyze and discuss them from divergent theoretical perspectives.

### Student Learning Outcomes (Should be measurable; observable; use action verbs)

Through readings and other materials, we will pursue the following course objectives.

1. Apply a sociological perspective to the world.
2. Use analytical and critical thinking skills; especially the ability to read, synthesize, and integrate a wide variety of materials.
3. Familiarize students with some of the important classical and contemporary literature/sociological theorists.
4. Express ideas in written communication.
5. Prepare students for other graduate courses and the written comprehensive exam.

### **AI IN DR. FARRIS' CLASSROOM**

You're welcome to use AI tools (like ChatGPT), Grammarly, or similar support services in this class—as long as you're using them the way you'd use me: as a resource to support your learning, not as a shortcut to avoid doing the work.

Think of it like this:

Would you ask me to write your discussion post for you?  
Would you ask me to complete your final project or reflection?

Probably not—and if you did, I'd (kindly) say no!

But would you ask me to help brainstorm ideas, explain a sociological concept, give feedback on a rough draft, or suggest ways to structure your response?  
Absolutely. That's using support in a way that still keeps the work (and the learning) yours.

**If you do use any AI tools (including Grammarly or ChatGPT), you must note it at the bottom of your assignment.**

Just a short line is fine—for example:

- “I used Grammarly to check grammar and clarity.”
- “ChatGPT helped me outline my initial ideas for this post.”
- “I asked ChatGPT to explain symbolic interactionism in simpler terms.”

Being transparent helps build trust and keeps our academic work ethical and clear.  
If you're ever unsure whether you're using AI appropriately, just ask yourself: *Is this something I*

*would ask my professor to do for me?*

If the answer is yes, you're probably on the right track.

### **A Note on AI/ChatGPT Use**

### Course Specific Procedures/Policies

#### Late Assignments

Students who need extra time may submit assignments (excluding discussion board postings) up to one week after the assignment due date. Discussion board submissions will not be accepted for credit after the deadline except in extenuating circumstances.

A penalty of 10 percent of the total value of the assignment will be applied to the grade achieved on the late assignment regardless of the day of the week on which the work is submitted.

Students who submit assignments more than one week late will receive a grade of zero on the assignment unless they have made prior arrangements with the instructor.

Weekly Discussions: There will be 10 online discussions. Discussion questions will be posted that relate to the books and other relevant readings.

NOTE: Online discussions should not be viewed as similar to a discussion around the dinner table with friends or family where everybody expresses their views, opinions, and beliefs on some topic which they know absolutely nothing about. Online discussions should reflect critical thinking and contain complete sentences that are grammatically correct. This is an academic course and your discussion topics will be linked directly to reading assignments. Your posts, as such, should reflect a certain amount of knowledge on the topic based on research, facts, and data. Cite your sources where appropriate. It is fine to critique, interpret, and occasionally interject an opinion or two, but for the most part, this should be an academic and intellectual discussion of the topic at hand. Always be polite and courteous when responding to someone else's comments or questions. The use of AI/Chat GPT is prohibited.

Critical Book Reviews: There will be 5 book critiques worth 100 points each. These should be 3-4 pages in length (typed, double spaced) and submitted to the appropriate Folder. See guidelines for writing reviews and see the course schedule for due dates of each review. The use of AI/Chat GPT is prohibited.

**Points are accumulated in this course instead of averaged. You will have a grade report on D2L keeping track of your points as this semester progresses. Your grade is not negotiable.**
