COURSE DESCRIPTION

This graduate course is a general introduction to second language (L2) teaching and learning, with an emphasis on the issues related to the teaching of Spanish. The course provides a strong foundation on theoretical research in the field, as well as practical approaches to design effective Spanish L2 courses at diverse levels of instruction. Participants will review and critically discuss core concepts related to current theories of L2 acquisition while exploring different approaches and methodologies, focusing on the impact of communicative, sociocultural and critical pedagogies in language learning. In addition, they will examine the current role of technology in L2 teaching and learning. Core activities include guided readings, video samples, design of teaching materials, and analysis of effective teaching strategies which can be adopted to diverse instructional contexts. The course will be conducted in Spanish although some of the readings will be in English.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

1. Analyze and critically compare contemporary theoretical frameworks in L2 teaching and learning.
2. Design, create and evaluate culturally responsive lesson plans that focus on 21st-century competencies in language education.
3. Implement culturally responsive lesson plans in short video demonstrations to showcase advanced delivery skills for the L2 classroom.
4. Advanced analytical skills by sharing research-supported feedback.
5. Critically examine the role of technology in language teaching by analyzing digital tools.

Collection of Data for Measuring Institutional Effectiveness:

Presentation

This online course will be delivered through TAMUC's MyLeoOnline (MSL) platform. You will use your TAMUC *MyLeo* account to access the platform and be able to use the course content, which includes short video presentations, readings and materials, discussion threads, and chat/email communication.

Student Responsibilities

Students' participation is essential and required to succeed in this course. Students are expected to: 1) actively engage in all classroom activities, 2) read the materials by the assigned date, 3) complete and submit the assignments by the due date, and 4) interact with each other and the instructor on a regular basis.

a. Course communication. Good communication in an online setting is a fundamental component of success. b. Feedback and assessment: You will be received detailed feedback on your HW, discussion posts and other tasks 72 hours after the activity is due (see the ‘Tentative Course Schedule’ for details). Participation in the online meetings and discussion boards will be assessed through a comprehensive rubric (see the “Course Resources” folder for details).

GRADING

Activities & assessments

Tests (SLOs 1 & 2. 20% of final grade): Students will complete **four tests** based on readings and course materials; tests will focus on analytical concepts, case studies, and teaching materials analysis (including activities, lesson plans, teaching resources and assessment). Please see the *Course Schedule* for relevant dates.

Online Participation (SLOs 1, 2, & 3. 20% of final grade): Interaction and discussion will be conducted by participating in **biweekly discussion forums**. The forums will include short-research activities, case studies, and questions related to the readings and complementary materials. Students will participate posting their answers to these activities by means of critical interpretation, offering counterexamples or discussion of particular cases. Students are expected to complete **a minimum of 3 postings per forum** (initial response + interaction with classmates; about 300-350 words each, in academic Spanish). Postings will be evaluated for content understanding, reasoning, interaction with peers, and language conventions usage. Please see *Online Discussion Rubric* in the ‘Recursos’ folder for details.

Lesson planning (SLOs 2, 3 & 4. 20% of final grade): Students will create **four lesson plans** to teach Spanish content integrating interpretative, interpersonal and presentational communication as well as cultural themes. Each original plan will clearly describe lesson objectives, content, time, sequence, activities, materials, and a short summary explaining the **theoretical background** that supports the plan design. Micro-teaching videos (SLOs 2, 3 & 4. 16% of final grade): Participants will plan and create two short videos (about 15 minutes long), demonstrating their teaching style; the micro-teachings will be based on any of the lesson plans created for this class. The videos will be uploaded and shared to be peer-reviewed by two classmates. See details in the *Micro-teaching Instructions* in the “Recursos” folder for details.

Peer review: (SLOs 2, 3, & 5. 12% of final grade): Participants will review the micro-teaching videos created by two classmates and provide well-articulated feedback, demonstrating management of theoretical frameworks and methodologies in L2 teaching. The feedback will be shared with the video author and the instructor. See details in the *Micro-teaching Feedback Instructions* in the “Recursos” folder for details.

Annotated digital resources: (SLOs 2 & 6. 12% of final grade): Participants will collaborate creating a curated collection of digital resources for Spanish language teaching. Each participant will evaluate **three assigned resources** and write a critical annotation for each, relating theoretical frameworks, key concepts, and strategic implementation in diverse instructional settings. The annotations will be shared in an open-resource collection.

1. Coursework

2. Syllabus Change Policy

3. Withdraws & Incomplete grade.

I reserve the right to drop a student from the course administratively for excessive absences or violations of the Code of Student Conduct. Incomplete grades (grade of “X”) are granted only under rare and extraordinary circumstances which are fully documented; students requesting an incomplete grade should contact the instructor as soon as possible, provide all pertinent documentation, and sign the ‘X’ grade contract which details the coursework they need to complete to pass the class.
