**COURSE DESCRIPTION**

The class is structured like a workshop. It is geared toward early and mid-career academics (pre- and post-tenure) who need to publish or writers who have “stalled” and need help on a major project (for example, finishing a book). The workshop/seminar is a hands-on 75 minute session, comprising an accountability writing group and a discussion of effective strategies and techniques to facilitate the writing of academic books and articles. Participants will work on at least one piece of writing.

Topics to be covered include overcoming procrastination and impostor syndrome; positive thinking and reinforcement; establishing and keeping momentum; the importance of planning (backward calendars) and tracking one’s output; writing for thinking; and finding flow and joy in writing.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

1. Participants will create and use weekly and project-based writing output tracking tools;
2. Participants will work on at least one major piece of writing (a paper, a chapter of a book, a book-length manuscript)
3. Participants will become familiar with various techniques to facilitate writing, including but not limited to beating procrastination and impostor syndrome.
4. Participants will engage in self-reflection on their writing practices with the goal to improve their performance and more importantly their attitude toward the practice.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

### **Minimal Technical Skills Needed**

Using the learning management system, using Microsoft Word, Web Browser, Google and Google Scholar, or similar search engines, use library web site.

### **Instructional Methods**

The course is delivered entirely online, via LMS and zoom meetings. The first week is spent doing several surveys on impostorism, procrastination, and writing practices as well as becoming familiar with the output tracking tools. The remaining weeks will include a live session divided into an accountability group (in which the participants report how much they have written in the previous week) followed by a one hour discussion/seminar on various topics relevant tot writing.

### **Participants Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course**

- Participants will be responsible for familiarizing themselves with the syllabus and all course instructions found in the online course platform
- Participant will be responsible for taking the surveys and self-assessment tools and examining their results.
- Attendance at the meetings is important.

### **Course Specific Procedures/Policies**

Since in a sense the only required output of the participants are the surveys/self-assessment tools and the weekly production reports, it is crucial that these outputs be delivered. If the participants cannot do so in the early part of the course, it will be less useful.

Final grades in this course will be based on the following scale:
