Course Description

This course is a survey of federal, state, and local judicial systems with an emphasis on pretrial, trial, and appellate criminal procedure. It includes a description of court structures and roles of the judges, prosecutors, defense attorneys, juries, and other court personnel.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Describe the structure and function of federal and state courts, including the roles of judges, juries, and attorneys.
2. Explore how a case moves through the court system and how judicial decisions are made
3. Compare state and federal courts and identify key similarities and differences in jurisdiction and authority.
4. Evaluate the role of courts in protecting individual rights and maintaining the rule of law in a democratic society.

A breakdown of course requirements and how each will contribute to your course grade is included below. *Assignments and exams may be made up without penalty if they are missed due to an excused absence.*

Legal Worksheets (20% of final grade, each worth 10%): In this assignment, students will gain hands-on experience using *Westlaw Academic*, a professional legal research database available through the Waters Library. Students will locate and analyze real legal documents and sources, including cases, statutes, and secondary materials, to practice identifying relevant information for legal analysis.

Discussion Board: AI and Courts (15%) In Week 4, students will be assigned supplemental reading and a discussion board debate prompt on the emergence of AI in the court system. Students should develop an introspective and well-developed discussion board response (~400 words). Posts will be evaluated holistically based on the student's overall engagement and contribution to the discussion.

NOTE: Students may earn extra credit on the final exam (1-4 points) for responding and participating in a substantive discussion with other student responses

Weekly Journals (20%, 2 entries, each worth 10%): Two journal prompts will become available under the Assignments folder in D2L. Students will have until the following Sunday at 11:59 to write a 400–500-word response, which should incorporate both class concepts and personal experiences. Extra emphasis will be put on introspective and well-developed ideas. Each prompt will correspond with that week's content area (e.g., child abuse or theories of victimization) and should be completed *after* viewing the week's lecture video and/or textbook reading. These can, and should, be informal. Citations, cover sheets, and other term paper requirements should not be used here.

Film Analysis Quizzes (20%): Students will complete two objective quizzes (D2L) over the semester's assigned media/documentaries: (1) Adam Foss' *A Prosecutor's Vision for a Better Justice System* (TedTalk) and (3) Robin Steinberg's *What if we ended the injustice of bail?* (TedTalk). Each quiz is worth 10% of total grade.

The links to both will be available on D2L with a reading guide to help prepare for the 7-10 question quizzes. Students will be given one hour once the quiz begins and are allowed to review the video during the testing period to help confirm their answer choices.

Final Exam (25%): One online exam will be administered (on Brightspace/D2L) in this course. The final exam will be graded on a 100-point scale and include approximately 33-40 multiple-choice and true/false questions. The exam will cover the assigned readings, uploaded lecture videos, and assigned multimedia. Students will need access to reliable internet services and a quiet work environment conducive to test taking. **The exam and access password will be made available online on the D2L system on June 29th at 9AM and close at 9PM on July 1st. Once a student is ready and opens the exam, they will have one hour (60 minutes) to complete all the questions. Students will not be able to go back to it throughout the day!** More detailed information on the procedure for taking online tests can be found on D2L under ONLINE EXAMS in the CONTENT folder.

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Makeup Exam Policy: I totally understand that life happens. Students that experience exceptional circumstances which cause them to miss a scheduled exam should contact me ASAP. Students that have a university approved absence or otherwise produce written documentation regarding their absence will be scheduled for a make-up time. Students that have not reported their absence or spoken to me within 2 days of the exam will be considered unexcused and receive a “0” score for that exam.

Classroom Guidelines

Electronic Device Policy: Please refrain from the use of electronic devices during class, as it is distracting not only to you, but also to your instructor and peers. Laptops should only be used for note taking unless they are part of the instructor assignment and discussion for the class day.

Classroom Civility, Respect and Tolerance: University study is largely about exposure to a diverse range of worldviews and lived experiences. **This course relies on challenging and critiquing deeply held societal beliefs over a wide range of sensitive topics.** Students should engage in discourse with other students and the instructor respectfully. **My classroom is predicated on principles of mutual respect** and students are expected to exhibit this same respect for the diversity of ideas. **Forms of incivility towards other students or the instructor will not be tolerated.**

Instructor Error: Because instructor errors can and do occur, students should keep an extra copy of any work they submit. In addition, make sure to keep and safeguard graded assignments and tests until final course grades have been posted.

Course Policies

Access to Grades: All grades will be available in D2L. Please note that I am unable to furnish any information about grades or student status via e-mail or telephone. This is considered a violation of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (FERPA), even with student permission or at student request. Verify your D2L grades often. Discuss grade posting errors/omissions with me immediately.

Borderline Grades: Students will not be awarded extra points at the discretion of the instructor. Be aware at the outset that this course has a firm policy against grade “bumping”. However, students will be automatically rounded to a higher letter grade at the .5 threshold (i.e., 89.5% is an A).

Incompletes: Grades of “incomplete” are given only under rare circumstances when students provide detailed documentation of a significant crisis (e.g., serious illness of the student or death in the immediate family) near the end of the semester and which render them unable to finish the course. Incomplete grades will not be given under any other circumstances. Students with circumstances negatively affecting their class performance should discuss the situation with me immediately so that we can identify and implement strategies for managing the problem(s).
