Course Information

Required Text: *No Textbook required. Lecture notes and videos provided by the Professor through D2L. Students can use any Principles of Microeconomics Textbook available in the library. Assignments are completely based on the lecture notes and videos provided by the professor.*

Course Basics:

Economics 2302 is a basic-level Microeconomics course that assumes knowledge of High school algebra. The course is designed as an overview of the essential elements of Microeconomics as an intellectual, decision-making discipline. Economics is normally treated as two distinct, though interrelated, broad sub-disciplines: Microeconomics and Macroeconomics. At the decision-making level, however, those dividing lines tend to be blurred. This course will focus on both pure theory (theory for the sake of theory) and theory as an aid to economic decision-making under resource scarcity relative to human wants at the individual household or firm level.

Instructional Methods: The professor will provide topical lecture notes and videos (if available) through D2L Brightspace Content and/or emails. Questions can be asked through email (kishor.guru-gharana@tamuc.edu) 24/7 throughout the semester.

Student Responsibilities/Tips for Success in the Course

1. Students are expected to:
 - a. Read the lecture notes provided by the Professor.
 - b. Watch and learn from videos provided by the Professor in D2L.
 - c. Work the assigned homework problems independently. Submit the homework problems through D2L.
 - d. Read the regular announcements in the Announcement section of the D2L Brightspace and download the posted materials with download links.

2. This syllabus is tentative for the semester. It is meant to be a guide. Certain topics may be emphasized more or less than indicated in the textbook, depending on the class's progress, and some may be omitted.

4. Homework problems are assigned and graded every week. Two topics are covered in each assignment, except for the first assignment, which covers three lectures. Solutions to the assignment problems will be provided after the grading. No late assignments will be accepted. There will be no makeup for missed assignments. This is the “Summer” class, with only four weeks to cover the material of a 15-week regular semester. So, there will be no extension of the assignment due dates. There is no “Final”- only four assignments.

5. Feel free to ask questions in class or through email. I am accessible 24/7, including weekends and holidays. You can ask any questions related to the course topics, and I will usually try to answer them within 24 hours.
