COURSE INFORMATION

Course Description

Demonstrates the relevance of psychosocial nursing concepts to all areas of professional practice. Provides a conceptual integration of the nursing process, theories, and research from psychosocial sciences and humanities as these relate to the care of persons with mental disorders. Clinical experience provides an opportunity for application of psychosocial concepts and methods in using the nursing process to promote optimal levels of wellness for individuals, families, and target groups.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, the student will be able to:

1. Analyze selected nursing and psychological theories used in psychiatric/mental health settings (PLO AACN Essentials Domain 1).

2. Examine the legal, economic, sociocultural, and ethical issues impacting the psychiatric/mental health delivery system and apply them in the clinical setting (PLO AACN Essentials Domains 7, 8 & 9).
3. Discuss clinical modalities and psychiatric terminology related to psychiatric/ mental health nursing practice (PLO AACN Essentials Domains 2 & 9).
4. Utilize principles of evidence-based practice in psychiatric mental health nursing (PLO AACN Essentials Domain 4).
5. Identify barriers to care for patients with psychiatric illnesses in the rural setting (PLO AACN Essentials Domains 1, 2 & 3).

Trigger Warning - Psychiatric/Mental Health classes discuss topics/issues of psychiatric and mental illnesses. In the didactic course, the student will receive contents on these topics. In the clinical settings, the student will closely encounter clients with these issues. If a student expects to be emotionally or psychologically impacted by these issues and topics, please contact your course or clinical instructor.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

A **MINIMUM** grade of 75% is required to pass the course. The average of the five (5) course exam grades **MUST** be 75% or greater before ANY other course assignment grades are averaged to compose the final grade. If the exam average is below 75%, the student will receive the grade of “D or F” for the course regardless of any other grade(s).

Clinical assignments are designed to evaluate both your clinical reasoning and your performance in the clinical setting. The clinical grade consists of patient-related written assignments, instructor observations of your clinical performance, and simulation pre- and post-work assignments. Each clinical assignment will be evaluated according to its respective grading rubric. To successfully complete the clinical portion of the course, students must earn a **minimum overall average of 75%** on all clinical assignments and simulation coursework. Clinical assignments must be submitted **no later than 2359 on the day following your scheduled clinical rotation or simulation**. Assignments may be submitted **only once**; therefore, students are encouraged to carefully review their work prior to submission. Any assignment submitted after the due date and time will be considered late and graded according to the criteria outlined in the applicable rubric. Once an assignment has been submitted, no revisions, corrections, or resubmissions will be accepted.

Students must adhere to the expected clinical behaviors. Any instance of violation of any of the objectives listed in the Professional Disciplinary Action Form may result in clinical suspension, receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation form, failure of clinical, failure of the course, and/or removal from the nursing program. Assessment Descriptions

Class Assessments

Exams

Purpose: To aid in assessing theory knowledge and application. Students will complete five module exams and a final exam during the course. Exam content includes material covered in the required readings/media and classroom assignments.

Instructions: The exams are closed book, will be timed, and are to be completed independently, unless otherwise stated (collaborative). Students will have **1 minute/question**, time starts once the exam is initiated. Questions will consist of varying formats to include multiple-choice, select all that apply, hot spot, fill in the blank, true/false, etc. Exams will be proctored according to the course schedule and will be administered in the ExamSoft/Examplify learning platform. Students should use their own laptop to take the exams.

Grading Criteria: Exam scores are based upon the number of questions that are correctly answered out of the number of test questions posed.

NOTE: Students reaching a Level 3 on the ATI CMS Proctored exam may drop their lowest module exam score.

ATI Engage Mental Health RN Pre-class Work

Purpose: Offer students learning scenarios to actively engage to formulate and develop fundamental knowledge and skills and therapeutic communication skills that aid in identifying potential biases and fears with the utilization of real-life scenarios and real-life examples.

Instructions:

Students are expected to complete all assigned Engage Modules as outlined in the course schedule *prior to class*. Completion data—including time spent, activity within the module, and assessment performance—is recorded within the ATI (Assessment Technologies Institute) system.

Additionally, the instructor has visibility into the following engagement metrics:

- Total time spent within each module
- Number of in-module questions completed
- Number of attempts on the end-of-module quiz
- Time spent completing the quiz

Students are expected to engage fully and complete all components as assigned.

Grading Criteria/Rubric: The instructor can only view and grade based on the most recent module submission, including the associated date, time, and score. Earlier attempts, even if higher, will not be considered for grading purposes.

Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue. On the third day overdue, a grade of 0% will be assigned. Communication regarding late or missed work is the student's responsibility.

Legal & Ethical Issues Presentation & Discussion Board

Purpose: This project is designed to enhance student understanding of evidence-based approaches to legal and ethical issues associated with mental health concepts, statutes, and research methods through collaborative analysis, creative presentations, and critical evaluations of a specified statute/ethical guideline. The project aims to increase awareness of mental health statutes in terms of challenges and benefits for caregivers and secondarily to enhance evidence-based knowledge and application of nursing care for the mental health client/caregiver.

Instructions: Students, in group assignment, will present in class a specified statute/ethical guideline for the presentation using visual/digital aides in the presentation to share the new knowledge context and application obtainment of challenges and benefits in caring for the mental health client/caregiver.

Grading Criteria/Rubric: See instructions, grading rubric, group assignments, and presentation date deadline in D2L.

ATI Content Mastery Series Online Practice Assessments

Purpose: Mental Health Content Mastery Assessment is to measure knowledge obtained during the semester using NCLEX_RN type questions. This testing measure knowledge level and offers remediation to help increase the understanding of mental concepts in a variety of settings.

Instructions: Students will take the ATI Proctored Mental Health Exam 2023 version in person during class time which includes NextGen content questions as scheduled. Practice Assessments will be assigned as noted in the course schedule. The practice exams will occur online as scheduled.

Grading Criteria: The grade for this component is based on the posted rubric, not on the CMS exam score. (See ATI grading rubric in the D2L course site under Course Resources.) The goal for each student is to obtain a minimum score of Level 2 on the first or second attempt. **Students must show time (minimum one hour) in ATI for the focused review or a score of zero will be recorded for that component.** If not achieving a Level 2, the student will be given a second opportunity. The course grade goes by the ATI rubric on how points are accumulated.

NOTE: Students reaching a Level 3 on the ATI CMS Proctored exam on the first or second attempt may drop their lowest module exam score or opt out of the final exam.

Clinical Assessments

Clinical Orientation Skills Lab

Purpose: To embody the study and practice of mental health nursing and the process of providing care for clients in the inpatient and outpatient settings. To demonstrate mental health concepts and assignments included are communications techniques and practices

Instructions: Written instructions for assignments are located in D2L

Inpatient Clinical Experiences

Purpose: To allow students the opportunity to apply skills and knowledge related to the study and practice of mental health nursing and the process of providing care for clients in the inpatient setting with varying diagnosis with varying means of knowledge analysis and application.

Instructions: The student is assigned various scheduled clinical days in an acute inpatient setting. The student will care for patients with different mental health diagnosis.

Grading Criteria: See Clinical Evaluation Tool

Simulation Experiences

Purpose: Expose the student to specific different types of mental health disorders that may not be experienced within the clinical setting. The concept of simulation (in the Simulation Lab and Swift River Virtual Reality Simulations) allows for the student to practice in a setting that allows for identifying areas for growth and new knowledge in a safe clinical practice environment for the student while also obtaining virtual charting experiences. Therefore, while attending clinical

experiences in the simulation lab, the student is required to: Conduct themselves as if they were in an actual client/patient care setting. Wear appropriate professional attire (student uniform) including ETAMU Identification Badge. Adhere to HIPAA standards and confidentiality related to all simulation-based experiences to include debrief, feedback and testing. Refrain from having candy, gum, food, or liquids in client/patient care areas. Treat standardized patients, simulators and manikins with consideration and respect (appropriate draping and privacy, etc.). Maintain the cleanliness of each client/patient care area. If required, check out all equipment and or supplies with the simulation lab staff (be aware that specific equipment and supplies cannot be taken out of the simulation lab).

Instructions: Student will attend three simulation experiences in the ETAMU Simulation Lab. Instructions and pre-packets will be sent prior to the simulations and must be completed as part of your clinical hours, if not completed the student risk of not completing the totality of clinical hours which could result in not meeting the course clinical requirements. Students will complete virtual clinical simulation hours using the Swift River ATI 2.0/EHR Tutor virtual clinical experiences in addition to the SIM Lab experiences

Grading Criteria: See Grading Rubric

Clinical Reflection Assignments

Purpose:

Students will complete a Clinical Reflection Assignment to document their clinical hours and critically reflect on their experiences, accomplishments, and learning during each clinical shift. Reflections should be aligned with the student learning outcomes for the course. The clinical instructor will establish expectations and due dates based on each student's individual clinical schedule.

Clinical Evaluations

Purpose: The evaluations allow for the assessment of the student's skills and knowledge attainment in meeting the established clinical outcomes as related to safely providing care for the mental health client and guided by the clinical evaluation tool.

Instructions: The clinical evaluation will be completed and reviewed with the student at the mid-point and at the completion of the clinical rotations and course as needed.

Grading Criteria: See Grading Rubric

Clinical/Lab Expectations

Students will receive a basic orientation to his/her assigned facilities. Students will provide basic nursing care to selected clients using the nursing process to help develop skills of assessment and inquiry. Accurate and thorough data collection reveals psychosocial, cognitive, and physiological conditions, which will enable the student to individualize client care and treat identified actual and/or potential health problems.

Students should refer to the “Clinical Schedule” tab for specific assignments.

Students will practice acquired knowledge/skills such as using professional communication, health record review/data collection, assessing vital signs, performing assessments. **Students may only perform skills previously taught and verified by faculty in the skills lab.**

Students should arrive on time for assigned clinical experiences, be in uniform (See BSN Student Guidebook), and be prepared to provide nursing care to assigned clients. Clinical instructors may send students who arrive more than 15 minutes late home. All missed clinical experiences will be required to be made up. It is the responsibility of the student to communicate if they will be arriving late, or not in attendance. Students who do not complete their 90 lab/clinical hours by the end of the semester will receive an incomplete (X) and will not be able to matriculate until the hours are complete.

Students are required to follow all facility policies. Even with use of proper personal protective equipment (PPE), students should not knowingly and willfully enter the room of a confirmed or suspected COVID-19 client.

Students will present clinical reflections/discussions during post conferences. Post conferences are part of their required 90 lab/clinical hours. Attendance is mandatory.

Participation is required. In addition, clinical faculty will expect to see at least two documented head to toe assessments from acute care which will be critiqued.

Students will be assigned some virtual clinical days (see schedule for specific dates) utilizing Swift River. Students will be given an assigned timeline to login and complete the virtual clinicals. Students must also have completed the virtual clinical day with a 75% or better. Failure to meet the required hours and/or the required minimum score will result in a failure of that clinical day, which may result in the student failing the clinical portion of NURS 4540. Detailed times and assignments will be given to the student via D2L prior to the assigned clinical day.

Course Specific Policies/Procedures

Assignment Submissions:

All class and clinical assignments must be submitted on time. If an extension is needed, students must request the extension before the posted due date/time. An assignment extension request will be approved or denied at the discretion of the course coordinator.

Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10% per day for each of the first two days overdue; on the third day, the grade will be assigned as 0%. Communication on these matters is the student's responsibility.

Multiple instances of late clinical assignments will result in receipt of a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and, possibly, failure of clinical/course.

File Submission Requirements: Unless otherwise specified, all assignments submitted electronically must be uploaded as either a **Microsoft Word (.docx)** document or a **PDF (.pdf)** file. No other file formats (including but not limited to JPEG, PNG, GIF, HEIC, Pages, Google Docs links, or ZIP files) will be accepted unless explicitly authorized by the instructor. Submissions in unsupported formats may be considered late until resubmitted in an approved format. Failure to follow these guidelines will result in a grade of “0” on the assignment.

BSN Program Student Guidebook

Students are responsible for reviewing, understanding, and complying with the policies and procedures provided in the student guidebook.

Classroom Policies

1. **Class Cancellation:** In the event that a class is canceled, the student is expected to do the readings and complete the objectives for that day. The content will still be included on examinations. The material in this syllabus and dates identified in the Course Calendar are subject to change.
2. **Class attendance** is expected. The students should notify course coordinator in advance of any absence.
3. **Exam dates** are listed in each course syllabus, and the student is expected to be present for exams. In the event that the student will be absent, the course coordinator must be notified in advance. Failure to do so may result in the student receiving a zero for the missed exam or quiz. Review the BSN Student Guide for the exam absence process.
4. As an adult learner and responsible professional, the student is responsible for reading and completing assignments prior to class and for being prepared to participate in discussions over the assigned material. It should not be expected that all material would be covered in class. Students are expected to come to class prepared.

Clinical Policies

1. **Clinical attendance** is mandatory. Refer to the BSN Program Student Guidebook for clinical attendance policy information. Violations of the clinical attendance policy may result in the student receiving a Student Performance and Behaviors Evaluation Form and may lead to failure of the clinical portion of the course.
2. **Immunizations, CPR, and TB status** must be current for students to be able to attend clinical experiences at the assigned clinical location. Suspension from clinical for failure to maintain required immunizations will be considered an absence.

3. Students are expected to meet clinical expectations outlined in the clinical evaluation tool.
4. Based on student learning needs, the faculty will determine the appropriate amount of time and clinical assignments needed to assess student growth.
5. Faculty may require additional assignments and clinical work to ensure students have met clinical objectives. Students are expected to comply with any additional assignments or clinical hours assigned.
6. Students are expected to prepare for clinical practice in order to provide safe, competent care.
7. Clinical assignments must be completed on time and submitted to the clinical instructor as directed. No exceptions will be given without prior permission from the instructor.

Group Work:

All members of the group will receive the same grade on any group work. However, a student can be removed from his/her team if the other students in the group come to the instructor and report that a student is not doing his/her fair share of the work. If that happens, the instructor will notify the student in writing. The student will then be responsible for doing the assignment on his/her own. It is expected that the group will make the attempt to resolve the situation within the group before instructor intervention.

Standardized Exams:

ETAMU School of Nursing utilizes Assessment Technologies Institute (ATI) content mastery practice assessments and content mastery proctored assessments to guide and assess mastery of nursing content necessary for entry into practice. Specific ATI assessment and grading guidelines are outlined in the document entitled “ATI Content Mastery Series (CMS) Assessment Grading Rubric” in the LMS module folder entitled ATI Assessment Grading Rubric”.
