Course Description:

This course is a survey of the principles and practice of the political system in Texas. In addition to examining the state constitution and the institutions that it empowers, a wider look is taken to consider local governments, the political system, and the actors in the political system.

You will not be taught *what* to think about political issues. You will be provided the knowledge base to determine *how* to think about political issues for *yourself*.

Learning Objectives:

1. Explain the origin and development of the Texas constitution.
2. Describe state and local political systems and their relationship with the federal government.
3. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in both theory and practice in Texas.
4. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches of Texas government.
5. Evaluate the role of public opinion, interest groups, and political parties in Texas.
6. Analyze the state and local election process.
7. Identify the rights and responsibilities of citizens.
8. Analyze issues, policies, and political culture of Texas.

Assignments and Grades:

1. Examinations: 360 points.

There will be three tests and one comprehensive final for a total of four exams. The three tests are worth 80 points each. The comprehensive final exam is worth 120 points.

Each test will be available for two days on D2L Brightspace. **If you miss an exam, you will receive a 0 for that exam.** If you are participating in an activity relating to the university that requires you to be away for the duration of the exam, contact your instructor **prior** to the exam, so proper accommodation can be provided. It is **your** responsibility to ensure the absence is **documented**. Do **NOT** assume that the department/group will email your instructor. If you have a legitimate reason for **NOT** being able to complete the exam (illness that requires professional treatment, family emergency, legal obligations, etc), you may request a make-up exam by emailing your instructor **within three business days** of the missed exam or as soon as physically possible. In your email, you must explain why the exam could **NOT** be completed and provide supporting documentation. **Make-up exams may be granted at the discretion of the instructor.** Students who missed the exam because they "forgot" the exam date(s) or do **NOT** email the instructor **within three business days** of the missed exam will **NOT** receive a make-up exam.

The comprehensive final exam will be conducted in-class during Finals Week as scheduled by the university.

2. Chapter Quizzes: 100 points.

There will be a quiz on D2L for each chapter that is covered. To ensure that students are reading the material **prior** to class, quizzes will be due **prior** to the **last scheduled lecture** for each chapter. Quizzes may consist of multiple-choice, true/false, and fill-in-the-blank questions. Each quiz is worth 10 points. The lowest quiz grade will be dropped as long as there is no instance of academic dishonesty. Refer to the **Academic Dishonesty** section.

If you experience technical issues, contact your instructor and D2L Brightspace immediately with as much information and documentation (screenshots), as possible. Refer to the Technical Support section for information on how to contact D2L Brightspace.

Once the quiz has closed on D2L Brightspace, it will **NOT** be reopened. Extensions will only be granted for **documented** reasons that cover the entire length of quiz availability.

3. Project: 80 points.

This is NOT a group project. Harold Lasswell defined politics as "Who Gets What, When, How." At the heart of politics is policy. Each student will write a letter to a specific state congressman presenting an argument supporting or opposing a bill sponsored by that state congressman during the 2025 session. A detailed guideline for this project will be outlined in D2L. **The use of AI is expressly prohibited.** Refer to the **Academic Dishonesty** section.

The deadline is strictly enforced. Late work is **NOT** accepted. Once the project has closed on D2L Brightspace, it will **NOT** be reopened. Extensions will only be granted for documented reasons that cover the entire length of assignment availability. Students may request an extension by emailing the instructor within three calendar days of the missed assignment. **Extensions may be granted at the discretion of the instructor.** Students who missed the assignment because they "forgot" the due date or do **NOT** email the instructor **within three business days** of the missed project will **NOT** receive an extension.

4. Participation: 30 points.

Participation is NOT simply showing up to class. Showing up to class is *attendance*. Participation consists of having read the material **prior** to class, being prepared to answer questions, and contributing to meaningful **in-class** discussion over the readings. Be aware that you **cannot** participate if you do **NOT** attend. This means if your attendance is lacking, so will be your participation grade.

Your participation grade may be further reduced by the following improper behaviors and may lead to being asked to leave class:

- Failure to abide by the Code of Student Conduct
- Repeatedly arriving to class late, leaving class early, missing significant portions of class
- Sleeping in class
- Electronics policy violations
 - You will receive **one** warning if you are using your phone, if your headphones are over your ears or earbuds are in, etc. The first violation **after** your initial warning results in losing **all** participation points. Each additional violation will result in a **2% reduction of overall** grade. If you have a legitimate need for your phone due to emergency situations, please alert your instructor **prior** to lecture.

5. Attendance: 30 points.

Students are required to attend class. Attendance will be taken during each class session. You may miss up to **three** lectures without penalty. More than **three** absences on non-exam days will result in a reduction in your grade.

Attendance Grade Scale

1-3 absences = no penalty

4-6 absences = deduct 10 points from your grade

7-9 absences = deduct 20 points from your grade

10+ absences = deduct 30 points from your grade

If I do not respond to you within two *business* days, please send a follow-up email as I may not have received your initial contact. Feel free to speak with me before or after class.
