Course Description and Student Learning Outcomes

Introduction to Graduate Study in Music - Two semester hours Description : The purpose of the course is to prepare students for advanced, in-depth study of music history and theory. The student learning objectives are, "Upon the conclusion of the course, the student will:

- a. List and explain the dates, important geo-political events, aesthetic philosophies, and critical attributes of each stylistic period, from the Middle Ages to the present;
- b. List and define major genres of music literature and cite significant composers and compositions in each; c. Analyze and describe the structure of music in terms of form, harmony, rhythm, etc. during the Common Practice Period and subsequent 20th Century techniques of composition (i.e. octatonism, serialism, etc.).

Attendance Expectations

Students are expected to attend all scheduled class sessions, arrive on time, and remain for the full duration of the class. Attendance will be recorded at the beginning of each session.

Absence Allowance

You are permitted up to **2 unexcused absences** during the semester without penalty. These absences do not require documentation and are intended to cover minor illnesses, personal obligations, or emergencies. If you have a musical opportunity that you need to miss class for, please let me know in advance.

Presentations

Each student will be responsible for three presentations throughout the semester. These presentations will be based around composers assigned on the first day of class. These presentations need to be 25 minutes in length and highlight the following:

- Composer name
- Dates
- Country of origin
- Period in which the composer is a part of
- Biographic information
- Notable historical events for this composer
- Notable works by this composer (At least 3 w/ links)
- One notable recording for the class to listen to
 - Notable characteristics of their music
- Background and history to one of the most recognizable works by the composer

Each student will also have a meeting with me at least one week before their presentation date to go over main talking points and to make sure you are set up for success for your presentations.

Comprehensive Notebook

Each student will be responsible for creating and maintaining a notebook. As a large component of this class will be student presentations, each student will be tasked with taking notes on each presentation. These notebooks will be a great reference for you going into other graduate courses and throughout your careers.

For each composer presented your notebook must contain the following components:

- Composer name
- Dates
- Country of origin
- Period in which the composer is a part of
- Biographic information

- Notable historical events for the composer
- Notable works by this composer
 - Notable characteristics of their music

This notebook will be checked during the middle of the term(October 20th) and on December 1st.

Term Paper

Each student will be responsible for writing a research paper which will be due on our last meeting of class(December 5th). This paper will be on a composer of your choice which will need to be approved by October 1st. This paper must use at least 5 reputable sources and be 1,500 words total excluding your bibliography.

In a similar fashion to the presentations, your paper must include:

- Dates
- Country of origin
- Period in which the composer is a part of
- Biographic information
- Notable historical events for this composer
- Notable works by this composer
 - Notable characteristics of their music
- Background and history to one of the most recognizable works by the composer

A rubric will be provided for the term paper as well on October 1st.
