Course Information

This course focuses on the application of supply chain and logistics concepts to complex business problems. Students will use analytical methods and quantitative models to evaluate supply chain decisions and develop practical solutions. Emphasis is placed on integrating data analysis, modeling, and managerial judgment to support effective planning and decision-making across supply chain operations.

Text: Reading materials are provided.

Course Format: This course is Web-based. You will find all the information and materials that you will need to complete the course in this syllabus, my emails, and on D2L. You will need your campus-wide ID (CWID) and password to log into the course.
