COURSE DESCRIPTION

Course Description:

The focus of this course will be on the defining of criminal acts, learning the theories that can be used to explain the participation or reason for perpetrating criminal acts, and exploring the public policies that are developed to respond to the threat and existence of criminal behavior.

Course Design:

This course will be a combination of face-to-face and online. Some assignments will be completed and/or turned in through D2L, and others will be turned in during class time. A combination of lectures, discussions, and presentations will be employed to investigate the subject area. Students are expected to participate in class discussions, to demonstrate that they are reading the material and to share with the class any interesting information associated with the subject matter of the class. The professor will work to integrate face-to-face and online assignments to increase the understanding of criminological theories by the student.

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Students will become familiar with the classic and contemporary theories of criminology, and demonstrate this familiarity by achieving pass score of all exams and other writing assignments
2. Students will become acquainted with the professional journals in the field of criminology, criminal justice and sociology, and demonstrate this acquaintance by reading assigned journal articles, plus successfully completing any assignments associated with this reading
3. Students will develop an understanding of the relationship between theory and research; this understanding will be demonstrated by participating in graded class discussions held during the semester
4. This course will endeavor to increase the student's skills in writing and verbal communication, especially in the topic areas of criminology and criminal justice; by conducting exercises within and outside of class that measure these skills
5. Each student will develop a reasonable amount of knowledge about the field of crime and criminology which will be displayed by student's performance on class exams and the successful completion of all other class assignments

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Minimal Technical Skills Needed

The class will use the D2L learning management system. Students in the class may be required to use or be able to perform tasks employing Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and using presentation and graphics programs, etc.

Instructional Methods

This class will use a mixture of face to face, in class activities, and D2L. Please make sure

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you read the class syllabus closely to keep up with assignments turned in during class and those submitted in D2L. Assignments submitted in D2L must be on time, on or before 11:59pm of the designated due date.

Methods of Evaluation:

(1) Objective Exams (5 exams @ 100 pts. each = 500 pts.) To be completed in classroom

In this class there will be five (5) objective (most likely multiple choice) exams during the semester. Each exam will be composed of fifty questions, and each exam will be worth 100 points. Although the chapters and the dates of the exams are stated below, they are also placed under the heading titled Course Outline/Calendar. **Please do not miss a test, no make-up is planned or will be allowed.** Those who feel adventurous and miss an exam will have to take a comprehensive exam at the end of the semester in addition to the final exam.

Objective Exam # 3 (Chapter 7) November 5, 2026

(2) Class Writing (5 writings @ 15 pts. each = 75) To be completed in classroom

During the semester there will be five (5) class writings. These writings will pertain to students answering a question or statement proposed by the professor which will deal with some aspects of criminological theory. Each writing will be worth fifteen (15) points.

(3) Research Article Exercise (2 research articles @ 20 pts. each = 40 pts.) To be completed in classroom

During the semester the class will be responsible for reading two (2) assigned research articles dealing with a specific criminological theory. These articles will be posted in the resource area of D2L and are likely to be given as handouts in class. On designated dates the class will be responsible for having read the article then prepared to do a writing assignment on that specific research article. Each research article writing answer will be worth 20 points.

(4) Student Selected Research Article Summary (2 Student Selected articles @ 30 pts. each = 60pts.) Submitted through D2L

Students are provided a format which must be used to summarize a research article selected by each individual student. (The articles discussed in class cannot be used for this assignment.) Students are responsible for summarizing two different research articles during the semester. The format for this assignment is attached to this class syllabus as Attachment A. The research articles must pertain to one of the criminological theories studied in this class or presented in the textbook. The summary is due on the date

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identified below by 11:59pm and must be placed in the appropriate submission area marked “Student Selected Research Article Summary.” These assignments are worth 30 points each.

Student Selected Research Articles (selected by student) Summary due:

October 4, 2026 by 11:59pm & November 10, 2026 by 11:59pm

- **Points to consider for maximum grade achievement:**
 - Format of summary followed as required
 - Pertinent details of article present/presented
 - Clarity exists in student’s writing

Student Responsibilities or Tips for Success in the Course

Students should plan to regularly log onto the course website. Students should be very aware of their study habit and how much time they should commit to each class, the amount of weekly study time and participation time will impact your degree of success.

In addition, here are some other points to consider:

Tips on How to be successful in this Class:

1. Students must commit serious time to reading the textbook, and other assigned readings.
2. Student should ask questions of the professor if there is any information, he/she does not understand.
3. Students should regularly attend class.
4. Students should take good, clear, and understandable notes from the lectures.
5. Students must commit a serious amount of time to preparation for the exams.
6. Students must make the most of the “easy” grades, so they help to balance or soften the more difficult grades.

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Assessments

2. *Students will become acquainted with the professional journals in the field of criminology...* (will be measured by accomplished work of each student writing a research article summary; and by the students reading and sharing in a discussion of two research articles selected for this task by the professor).
3. *Students will develop an understanding of the relationship between theory and research...* (will be demonstrated by students participating in the discussion of the two research articles and by the writing to be performed in and outside the classroom).
4. *This course will endeavor to increase the student's skills in writing and verbal communication...* (this assessment will occur through the speaking of students during the class discussion and the writing assignments such as the research article summary, and others).
5. *Each student will develop a reasonable amount of knowledge about the field of crime and criminology...* (to be demonstrated through all the assignments and tasks identified with this class).

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Attachment A: Instructions for Research Article Summary Selected by Students

Instructions for writing Research Article Summary Exercise

Naturally, you want to provide the bibliographical information of the research article first. Place this at the top of the page (center it) and it should contain the following information:

Name of author(s)
 "Title of Article"
Title of Journal
 volume: complete number of pages, year of publication

For Example

Volkan Topalli. "When being good is bad: An expansion of neutralization theory."
Criminology 43:797-827, 2005.

Now, proceed to summarize the article:

Focus, Purpose or Goal of Article

1. Make sure you describe the focus, purpose, or goal of the article. These should all be the same. To make this easier to read, students should use these headings.

Sample

2. If a sample was used in the research, then describe the sample and identify how it was collected or selected. If the article is a theoretical piece, then there will be no sample and if that is the case then simply omit this area.

Findings

3. Describe the finding(s) of the research. What was the author(s) able to establish from the research should be described, discussed here.

Conclusion

4. What conclusions did the author(s) draw or write in the article? So make this a conclusion session which should be different from the findings.

Article's Application

5. In your last paragraph (or more if needed) develop a statement (brief discussion) of how this article fits into the understanding of the focus of the class, crime profiling. Relate the article/research to what we have talked about during this semester, criminological theory.
